

THIS DAY IS OURS

Children's Day calls for something special in the home blessed with children. Perhaps there is a party for a group of young friends. Perhaps your children will enjoy a party of their own. At any rate, special tactics are required by children and are certainly in order. Here are a few recipes that you will find very desirable:

Fruit Salad Sparkle

1/2 cup boiling water
1 3/4-ounce package lime-flavored gelatin
1 cup ginger ale
4 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup grated soft American cheese
1/2 cup sliced ripe olives
2 tablespoons pickle relish
1 tablespoon mayonnaise for filling
6 canned pear halves

Pour boiling water over gelatin and stir to dissolve. Add ginger ale, lemon juice, and 1/2 cup mayonnaise and blend. Place in refrigerator until thick but not firm. Combine cheese, ripe olives, pickle relish, and one tablespoon mayonnaise and blend. Follow out center of pear halves to allow for stuffing (portion removed may be reserved for other use) and fill with olive-cheese mixture. Pour sufficient gelatin in pan or mold (about 8 1/2 x 5 1/2 x 1 1/2 inches) to cover bottom; place pear halves stuffed side down over gelatin. Pour remaining gelatin over pears and let stand until firm. Cut in squares to serve, allowing one pear half to a serving. Serves 6.

Three-in-One Sherbet

1/2 cup pureed apricot pulp
1/2 cup orange juice
1/2 cup Hawaiian pineapple juice
1 cup water
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup cream
1 egg white

Prepare apricot pulp by forcing apricots through a sieve. Add orange and pineapple juices. Boil sugar and water together 3 minutes, add to the fruit mixture; cool. Freeze to a mush in freezer or refrigerator tray, then fold in the stiffly beaten cream and stiffly beaten egg white, finish freezing. Stir at times during freezing if sherbet is in refrigerator tray. 8 servings.

Prune and Brazil Nut Souffle
5 egg whites
1 cup sweetened prune pulp
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/2 cup ground Brazil nuts
Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold in sweetened prune pulp which has been forced through a strainer. Fold in salt, lemon juice and rind and Brazil nuts. Place in top of a well greased two quart double boiler, cover and cook over hot water one hour. Turn out of pan and garnish with whipped cream and whole Brazil nuts.

Cooked apricots, cranberries, fresh peaches or berries, sweetened to taste may replace the prune pulp.

CEBARY WELLS . . . Well-known plastering contractor who resided in Lomita at 2017 263rd street since 1921 passed away Saturday at White Memorial hospital at the age of 54 years.
