CAMPERS: GET FIRE PERMITS

Must Follow Rules for Safety In Forests

Before starting on a camping trip which may take you into national forest areas, don't forget to obtain a permit if you contemplate pitching your tent in the brush and among the trees. This warning is broadcast by national forest officials through automobile clubs and other organizations.

Permits are required for all campers, and for all gasoline, kerosene and other fuels. They are issued with conditions and are good for one year. Each person's permit must sign and abide by the following:

- Not to build fires in forest lands closed to the building of fires.
- Not to smoke on forest lands closed to smoking, camp, and places of public use and in special posted areas.
- Keep Camp Clean.
- To completely extinguish burning matches, cigarettes and pipes, throwing them away.
- To carry a shovel and a minimum size: shovel length 36 inches, blade 6 inches; axe, overall length 42 inches, head 2 pounds in weight.
- To clear a space 10 feet in diameter of needles and trash before opening a fire.
- To leave no fire even for a short time.
- To extinguish all water, except in closed or improved campground must be left in such that the fire cannot be started.
- To maintain a clean camp, burning of all refuse or disposing in receptacles provided.
- To see that all one's party know of these regulations.

June 15 Deadline For Employees, Hyde Warns

California employers subject to the Unemployment Reserves Act for the first quarter of 1937 have until midnight, June 15, to pay contributions. This announcement was made today by Carl L. Hyde, executive director of the State Department of Employment.

Hyde said that after June 15 interested employers will take effect. Interest of one percent a month is charged on delinquent contributions.

Formation of a new and stronger Chamber of Commerce will be discussed by residents of the Keystone area at a meeting in the home of J. R. Hilpert, community leader and officer in the former Chamber, tomorrow night.

The Keystone Chamber has disbanded for the past three years and civic development has been practically at a standstill during that time, backers of the new organization declare. An attempt to convert the newly organized Keystone Improvement association into a Chamber of Commerce failed recently when labor groups opposed the name change, it is reported.

Loren Howe, president of the Harbor District Chambers, has offered his cooperation in the formation of an affiliate group.

She is also a Torrance high graduate, with the class of 1934, and is employed as a stenographer. Previously to her bank position, Miss Smith was with the Hydril company. She replaces Miss Betty Stevenson, who resigned to accept a position with the National Supply company.

The first will be a dance sponsored by the Coordinating club, for the high school club. This will be held June 18, with a WPAA supplying the music.


