Congressman Colder at the Capitol

WASHINGTON, June 3. (Special to The Herald)—The Relief bill was finished in sweat, perspiration, tired bodies and ragged nerves. We were in session from 12 o'clock noon until midnight. A bitter fight was waged on many points of the bill. Six times the roll was called on this bill and its amendments, in addition to two other roll calls, making eight in one day. That is a record for roll calls in the House. Each requires 35 minutes.

The President's recommendation for a billion-and-a-half dollars prevailed. In the heat of a fiery contest, the salary of Harry Hopkins was cut from \$12,000 to \$10,000 a year, but was restored by a roll call. One of the famous economists who fought to save \$2,000 on Hopkins' salary, voted along with the rest of us to raise the bill a half-billion dollars. That gave some of the members a good laugh.

State Plan Falls
As the bill goes to the Senate, it provides \$415,000,000 for highways, roads and streets; \$630,000,000 for public buildings, parks, public utilities, rural electrification, sewer system, water supply, airports, flood control and other conservation; assistance for educational, professional and clerical persons, self-help cooperatives and women's projects; \$380,000,000; and National Youth Administration, \$75,000,000.

A group in the House were strong advocates of dispensing entirely with the Relief Administration setup and paying the money direct to the states for

administration, with a further proviso that the states be required to match dollar for dollar. This idea did not prevail, but it showed considerable strength.

COURT BOOMS

There is much discussion on Capitol Hill concerning the President's choice for the vacancy in the Supreme Court. Senator Joseph T. Robinson, from Arkansas, and the Democratic floor leader in the Senate, appears to be the favorite. In case he is appointed by the President, Senator Alben W. Barkley, of Kentucky, is reported to have the inside as the future Senate floor leader. Barkley is also mentioned as a possible candidate for the Democratic nomination for President in 1940. He made the outstanding speech at the Democratic convention in Philadelphia in 1936, and is a man of splendid leadership and recognized integrity. There are a number of boomlets being nursed for the Democratic nomination at the next election.

RETURN TO HONESTY

The heat has been turned off of President Roosevelt and his Supreme Court plan for a few days, at least, because of his message on tax dodgers. The loss in income taxes has materially reduced the government's revenues. The Treasury department started an investigation and found that a number of rich taxpayers have devised schemes to avoid the income tax. These methods are rather startling and have prompted an investigation by Congress.

The ways and means committee of the House spends much of its time in stopping the loopholes in the tax laws, but there seems to be a number of very smart lawyers who are just as busy finding new methods of evading taxation. Some of these slick tax dodgers incorporated their race horses, fancy chickens or expensive yachts and thereby sought to greatly reduce their incomes. Since some of them have been caught, investigation will probably disclose many others and, in the long run, they will find it probably the better plan to do as the average taxpayer does—make an honest return.

PENSION SUPPORT LAGS
The Townsend General Welfare Bill has lost some of its former support. Some of the Democrats are very much peeved because of the recent attacks that Dr. Townsend has made upon the President; others were not enthusiastic about Dr. Townsend's plan to borrow five million dollars on \$500 of security. This plan was found to be a violation of the postal regulations and is now barred and has been dropped. We are informed, Congressmen McGowan has a request before the ways and means committee for a hearing on his bill.
