Congressman Colderen at the Capitol

WASHINGTON, June 10.

(Special to The Herald)—One of the most important messages sent by the President to Congress is his recommendation for the planning of the great river basins of the country for the purpose of developing navigation, flood control, power development, the conservation of water and soil, and kindred problems. The President recommends that the country be divided into seven regional authorities or agencies—(1) the Atlantic seaboard; (2) the Great Lakes and Ohio Valley; (3) the basin of the Tennessee and Cumberland rivers and adjoining areas; (4) the Missouri river and the Red River of the North; (5) the drainage basins of the Arkansas, Red, and Rio Grande rivers; (6) the basins of the Colorado river and rivers flowing into the Pacific south of the California-Oregon lines; (7) the Columbia river basin.

GETS BIG JOB ... A heated contest arose as to what committee should have charge of this important legislation. Whittington of Mississippi, chairman of flood control, made a motion to refer this legislation to his committee. Mansfield of Texas, chairman of rivers and harbors, asked that the matter be referred to his committee. After a debate of one hour, a vote was taken and the plea of the flood control committee was rejected by a vote of 61 ayes and 166 noes. After this overwhelming defeat, Whittington withdrew his motion and Mansfield's motion was approved by a unanimous vote. The jurisdiction of these two committees has conflicted for some time. In order to clarify the situation, Speaker Bankhead decided to submit the proposition to the House for a decision.

This action of the House involves very heavy work on the committee on rivers and harbors. It will necessitate continuous hearings for a number of weeks. It is an intensely interesting subject and involves a policy that will affect every part of the United States. As a member of the rivers and harbors committee, I am happy to participate in this outstanding program which is now one of the most important subjects before Congress.

"SPOILED BOYS" ... A few members of Congress want to talk, talk, talk. They are not satisfied with time under general debate or during consideration of a bill under the five-minute rule, but want a special time set aside for a definite period, usually from 15 minutes to one hour. Sam Rayburn, Democratic floor leader, has been objecting to these requests unless they were made for time after the disposition of the day's business. Some of the members—those who are afflicted with perpetual talking—ob-

jected to this procedure. It was their desire to harangue members of Congress with partisan speeches and delay the real business before Congress and act like spoiled boys rather than as statesmen.

TAX PUBLICITY ... I was very much opposed to the repeal of the publicity features of the income tax law. I see no reason why the same publicity should not prevail concerning incomes as exists concerning the tax on real estate and personal property. Publicity serves not only to correct errors in assessments, but it is a preventive of favoritism and the evasion and avoidance of taxes.

Recently a bill was introduced which repealed the proviso that required the treasury department to submit to the ways and means committee a list of salaries of \$15,000.00 or more. I believe these are steps backward and that secrecy in income taxes aids and abets those who are trying to defeat the payment of just taxes.

President Roosevelt's recent message disclosing a number of schemes to defeat the payment of income taxes has brought the question of publicity again to the attention of Congress. I believe full publicity should be restored to every kind of taxation wherever feasible.

TREES WIN ... John McGroarty's bill for the purchase of 7,500 acres of beautiful virgin sugar pine forest adjoining Yosemite has passed the House. Congressman Englebright, in whose district the forest is located, opposed the McGroarty Bill. A lumber company is preparing to move in and begin the cutting of this forest, that has been growing from five to six hundred years. It was a battle of public parks against a sawmill. It is with pleasure that I report that the sawmill lost and the friends of trees won. McGroarty made an eloquent speech in behalf of his bill. A similar bill has passed the Senate. Anyhow California had a battle of her own.

Closed Stores Are Reopened

All of the Safeway stores in Wilmington, San Pedro and Lomita which had been closed since early in May on account of labor trouble opened their doors and resumed operation last Friday morning.

One change in personnel at the Lomita store was noted. Ronald Coil, who was formerly with the Safeway store at 1915 Carson street here, became manager of the Redondo-Wilmington boulevard store, succeeding G. K. Smith, who was transferred to another unit. R. R. Campbell is manager of the Safeway store at Lomita boulevard and Narbonne avenue.
