

Council Adopts Lower Water Rates; In Effect Now

STRIKE ENDS QUIET WEEK

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restraining order obtained by the laundry, were at liberty again this week.

For the first time since the strike began, pickets extended their line to a location other than that occupied by the laundry or its pick-up stations in other cities. Wednesday morning three pickets bearing placards started parading in front of the Cravens apartments at 1414 Cravens avenue. A few minutes later they were recalled, because, it is said, they made a "mistake" in their move.

The only damage reported to police during the week was that believed attributable to the labor difficulty occurred early Wednesday morning and then the persons who injured two chunks of concrete thru a residence window damaged the "wrong" home, police said.

The missiles shattered a window in the residence of Harry Borden, National Supply worker who lives at 1008 Sierra place. Next door lives a laundry truck driver who has remained on the job. Officer Spehger, called to investigate, observed a car cruising in the neighborhood and when it stopped he questioned the occupants. They proved to be a local resident who has taken a deep interest in the strike and a San Pedro man. Both denied knowing about the concrete-hurling episode, however, and they were not detained.

In Los Angeles the fines paid for the four striking workers, aggregated \$160, were deposited by Mike Shulman, laundry union organizer, in Superior Judge W. Turney Fox's court, the day after the defendants had asked for a continuance until Tuesday of this week to pay their fines. Eva Roseman was fined \$70 on two counts, Freda Evans \$50, Virgil Shinn \$20 and Emma Allgood \$20.

Trial Date Not Set

Judge Fox also found Ethel Kirk, another of the defendants named in the temporary restraining order, guilty of contempt on an order to show cause and imposed a fine but suspended it immediately. Archie Snow cited, for contempt, was freed at the conclusion of the argument early last week.

Court records disclosed this week that Ralph K. Pierson and George W. Henderson have been added to the plaintiffs' legal counsel. Culp and Culp, attorneys, will be retained however, to fight for a permanent injunction when it comes to trial several weeks hence, if the strike lasts that long. No trial date has been set yet this week.

COUNTY ADOPTS NEW PICKETING ORDINANCE

Picketing in Long Beach and other unincorporated areas of Los Angeles county will be made more difficult after July 30 by virtue of an ordinance adopted late yesterday by the board of supervisors.

The ordinance makes it necessary to obtain a permit from the sheriff before carrying or exhibiting any sign or statement on a banner in county area. Violation of the ordinance, effective 30 days after adoption, is punishable by a fine of \$500 and six months in the county jail, as the maximum.

Votes of Supervisors Gordon McDonough of the second district, Leland Ford of the fourth district and Chairman Roger Jessup of the fifth district, which embraces more than half of the county, adopted the ordinance. Supervisor John Anson Ford was in Washington, and Supervisor H. C. Legg left the meeting room just before the ordinance was brought up for adoption, section by section.

Savings On Bills Will More Than Offset Levy to Be Assessed On Real Property for Bond Principal

As exclusively reported by The Herald last Thursday, the city council approved a new water rate, minimum meter charges and deposit schedule Tuesday night and decided to put the reduced rates into effect for the June bills. The lowered tariffs, made possible by placing the water bond principal payment as a charge on real property in Municipal Water District No. 1, will result in a net saving to property-owning water consumers of between \$4 and \$11 annually.

Under the new plan, the revenues of the water

district will be used to meet the interest charges on the bond issue. The water tax for 1937-38, the first to be charged in two years, will be 55 cents per \$100 assessed valuation of real property. The reduced water charges will, in nearly all cases, more than offset the cost of the water tax, according to data prepared by W. H. Stanger, water superintendent.

Transfer of Mrs. Mabel Redfield, director of the Torrance welfare district to take charge of the Belvedere welfare district, effective today, was announced by Rex Thomson, county superintendent of charities. Miss Ann Newburgh, director of the Santa Fe district, will be transferred to the local welfare district.

The policy of transferring directors of social service work has produced satisfactory results in other departments, Thomson said, and has received endorsement from many persons familiar with the problems of Los Angeles county. In most instances the new assignments have been made so that the directors will have offices closer to their homes.

Three annual contracts were renewed by the city council for the fiscal year starting today at Tuesday night's session. They were: With Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital to furnish first aid or emergency service at the rate of \$50 a month for persons unable to pay for

such aid; with the county health officer to serve as city health officer at the rate of \$15 per visit or inspection, the same rate as last year; and with The Torrance Herald at the same rates as last year for publication of legal notices.
