### Pipe Organ Used for First Time Sunday At St. Andrew's Church

Last Sunday was a red letter day in the history of St. Andrew's Episcopal church. At the 11 o'clock service the new pipe organ was used for the first time. Great expectations were more than realized, the splendid tone quality of the individual stops and the volume of the "full organ" being a pleasant surprise to the large congregation.

The instrument has been specially voiced and adapted to the uses of the church, and the added impressiveness and dignity of the service puts St. Andrew's church in a class with many large churches in Los Angeles.

The pipe front is an adornment to the chancel, the key-desk being placed on the opposite side of the choir. The organ is entirely electric and is the last word in simplicity and dependability.

The choir sang a special "Te Deum" in honor of the occasion, the anthem and service being performed without any rehearsal because the organ was only finished by the Robert Morton organ builders late Saturday afternoon.
