PARIS. (U.P.)—It seems the shortest dancing frock is here to stay. Long, trailing skirts are not appropriate for summer and the waltz skirt has been adopted by all the big fashion houses for informal summer evenings.

Tulle, sheer organdies, mousselines and starched chiffons are used for these frocks, which usually are sleeveless and backless with full ankle-length skirts of fold after fold of material. The skirts often are finely worked into a series of tucks or small puffs or diamond-shaped designs. Some dressmakers edge the skirts with hand-made or ruffled in contrasting shade or a rainbow of colors.

One house shows the practical summer evening gown with a short skirt in front and a definite backward dip to greater length. These full skirts resemble the tarleton skirts worn by ballet dancers. The material is gathered into so many small folds so that the skirts swing out gracefully in wide sweeps with every movement of the body.

These short skirts are far more practical than floor-length ones which are likely to get trampled underfoot when dancing, and their width and fullness makes them graceful as well as practical.

Many of the waltz frocks are made with brief jackets of the same material, sometimes doubled so as not to be transparent. The jackets follow two general style rules—either short and fitted with long sleeves or the full-length bolero type.
