GAMBLING GRUNION FAIR PREY STARTING TONIGHT

Open season on grunion starts tonight.

That means that the Southern California public can again gather on moonlit beaches when the tide is high to catch those strange specimens of marine life as they squirm and flop on the sand between waves.

In announcing the resumption of the open season, Spencer D. Turner, county forester, fire and game warden, explained that the closed season during April, May and June is designed to protect the silvery smelt during the height of their spawning season in order to prevent their extinction. Persons who violated the close season received heavy fines in recent months, he said.

"Grunion are the only marine fish which come ashore to lay their eggs," he explained. "This shows some wise planning on nature's part, for the number of eggs which they lay is very limited in comparison with the vast numbers laid by other fish, and consequently they must take extra precautions to protect them from their enemies."

Offers No Prediction "The canny instinct which is responsible for these precautions brings them ashore on the first few evenings after high tide, and not at the peak of the tide. This reduces the likelihood of succeeding waves eroding the upper reaches of sand and washing the eggs back into the water before the two-weeks hatching period is over."

"High tides come at the full of the moon and the dark of the moon, but the grunion usually make their runs while the moon is bright. This shows more wise planning on nature's part, for the tide at the dark of the moon is highest, and, coming several weeks after the run, erodes the sand enough to free the eggs and wash them back to sea."

Turner refused to make any predictions when or where the fish could be seen, but pointed out that July 23 is the date of the next moonlit high tide. Grunion run on the second, third and fourth nights thereafter, which, on this occasion, will be 9:15 p. m., 9:56 p. m. and 10:38 p. m., respectively. The runs usually last for about an hour, beginning with the turn of the tide.

Track Promoters Confident of Getting Permit

So confident are the promoters back of the proposed second horse racing track for Los Angeles county that they came forward today with a request to the board of supervisors asking that the county take steps to improve a nearby street at a cost of \$79,000.

Construction work on the track has never stopped since it was started near the city of Inglewood several months ago, altho the promoters, the Hollywood Turf club, has not been able to get its permits thru the state horse racing commission. It is understood that stock still is being sold on the track.

"The Hollywood Turf club is vitally interested in improving Crenshaw boulevard, as it is now engaged in building a first-class major track on its property adjacent to the Potrero Country club, and will have it ready for operation about Oct. 15," Attorney Claude Andrews wrote the supervisors. It is in the fourth supervisory district of Supervisor Leland M. Ford.

Richfield Plans Two More Units At Watson Plant

Expansion of its refinery at Watson, near Torrance, by construction of two combination crude topping and cracking units to cost \$5,000,000, was announced this week by the Richfield Oil corporation. Work is to start immediately on the project which will require a year to complete.

Each unit will have a daily capacity of 30,000 barrels. The output of the refinery will be increased 25 percent. A polymerization plant will be installed with a daily capacity of 6,000,000 cubic feet of gas. This plant makes gasoline from so-called waste gases.

The plant is designed to use electric power exclusively in heaters, fractionating towers, reeling houses and other auxiliary equipment.
