

FOUR THOUSAND CHILDREN TO SEE ANNUAL POLICE SHOW

More than 4000 children will be guests of business men and motion picture stars at the Third Annual Police Show the night of July 9, it was announced yesterday by Deputy Chief Homer B. Cross.

Through the generosity of many citizens, orphans and underprivileged children will be furnished tickets. Last year the motion picture stars sent hundreds of these unfortunate kids to the show. The gesture has been adopted by many people all over the city this year, Chief Cross declared.

All major studios are contributing scenes from their latest releases and will reenact them with practically all principals of the cast.

The spectacular show will start with a grand entrance by a battalion of police led by pretty Betty Atkinson, 17-year-old film dancer and honorary drum majorette of the American Legion Police Post Band.

Police participation will include the sharpshooting pistol team of the department, motorcycle drills and stunts, and 200 student policemen will show just what he has to go through before he is regularly assigned.

The large native scene from "Waikiki Wedding", Bing Crosby's latest starring vehicle from Paramount, will be reenacted with 150 natives.

"Changing the Guard", Warner Brothers' latest technicolor starring Sybil Jason and 24 beautiful girls, will be another feature.

A dance set from the latest Astaire-Rogers picture at R.K.O., "Shall We Dance", Mischa Auer, Jimmy Savo and Ella Logan, Sophie Tucker and Judy Garland are but a few of the great stars who have consented to "do their bit".

The money raised by this benefit will be used for the development of the summer camp "Valyermo", maintained by the department, where last year 1800 underprivileged children were given a vacation; the training grounds and pistol range, and for widows and orphans of officers killed in the line of duty.

6 New Patients Enter Hospital

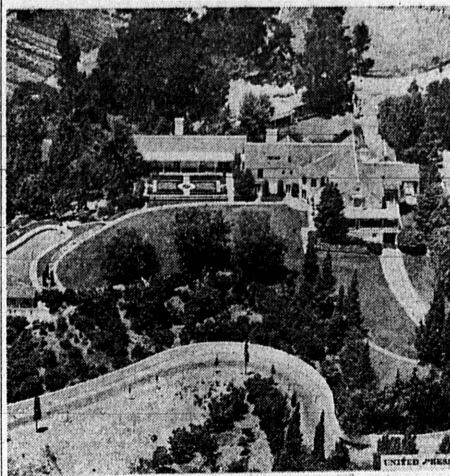

Merriam Signs Hospital Bill

Strongly supported by Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital officers and those of other hospitals in the state association, Assembly Bill No. 1132, providing for group hospitalization, was signed by Governor Merriam just before the "deadline" this week. This measure allows hospitals and the public to create associations for prepayment of services, although it cannot be labeled a "hospital insurance" plan.

Within 30 days the officers of the local institutions expect to receive details of the prepayment plan which may be adopted here. The Association of California Hospitals, which has most of the outstanding institutions in its membership, was formed to function under this law and is eager to make this service available to the public.

The new law is said to be particularly beneficial to employed groups and will decrease the cost of hospitalization in tax-supported institutions. It is believed to be the most advanced cooperative method of taking
