

labeled a "hospital insurance" plan.

Within 30 days the officers of the local institutions expect to receive details of the prepayment plan which may be adopted here. The Association of California-Hospitals, which has most of the outstanding institutions in its membership, was formed to function under this law and is eager to make this service available to the public.

The new law is said to be particularly beneficial to employed groups and will decrease the cost of hospitalization in tax-supported institutions. It is believed to be the most advanced cooperative method of taking
