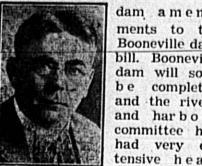

Congressman Corden at the Capitol

WASHINGTON, July 1. (Special to The Herald)—I have had the jitters for several months



over Boulder dam amendments to the Booneville dam bill. Booneville dam will soon be completed and the rivers and harbors committee has had very extensive hearings on a bill which sets up the legal machinery for the operation of this great lock for the passing of ships, its public power plant, and the disposal of electricity.

In the bill on the same subject last session of Congress, we inserted amendments to remove the discrimination existing against the Boulder-dam project. Southern California was obliged to underwrite the Boulder dam and guarantee the payment of its cost, plus four percent interest, within 50 years. Now that the present administration is more favorable to the development of public power, the rate of interest on these latter projects has been established at around three percent, thus causing a discrimination against the users of Boulder dam power and light of one percent interest. This amounts to many millions of dollars in the course of 50 years and falls on the consumers of Southern California.

After the hearings dragged out for many months, the bill was finally reported from the rivers and harbors committee with the Boulder dam amendments intact. Being the only member of this committee from Southern California, I had to undertake the burden of battling thru this amendment.

Secretary Ickes at one time wavered on his support of these amendments. President Roosevelt at one time questioned them. I finally succeeded in satisfying most of those who were skeptical and the bill now begins its journey in the House where further battles will probably be fought. Anyhow, I am

considerably relieved to get the bill thus far.

BOURBON OUTING...

We had a big day with President Roosevelt at the Democratic clubhouse on Jefferson Island in Chesapeake Bay, about 15 miles out from Annapolis. The Naval Academy furnished us transportation. When we landed on the island we were directed to the welcome shade of an old apple tree to meet the President. He was sitting in an arm chair, in his shirt sleeves, with his collar unbuttoned and seemed to be in the usual happy spirit. The President sat under the apple tree all day. His lunch was served on a card table. From three to perhaps 30 Congressmen were enjoying the shade and the camp chairs around the President. It was the greatest story-telling day that I ever experienced. The President did his part. He told of the days when he was in the New York legislature, of his experiences as governor, and many humorous incidents of his campaign for President. There was little or no discussion of political issues. It was just a sort of get-together picnic like we have in California. Lunch was served on a long table and consisted of cold meats, slaw, pickles, rolls and coffee. Some of the visitors played baseball and others lounged around the clubhouse.

RED RECEPTION...

I attended a reception at the Russian embassy for the three transpolar fliers who have been making a tour of America since their landing at Vancouver. I remember the bored and tired manner of Charles A. Lindbergh when he appeared in Los Angeles on his tour of triumph after his successful flight to Paris. The three Russian fliers were smiling and happy in appearance. They seemed to enjoy the occasion in their honor, although a few of the guests could speak their language. I sat in a corner, in an easy chair, and watched the 600 guests file past. The guest that attracted the most attention was John L. Lewis, C. I. O. leader. Whatever your opinion may be of Lewis, he is one of the most striking men I have ever seen. The next center of attraction among the guests was Emil Ludvig, the famous historian and biographer. He monopolized Lewis most of the evening.

When we walked into the embassy, which was brilliantly lighted, we had to pass the guards who checked our names off of the chart so that no uninvited guest might enter. Then we climbed the wide marble stairs to the second floor, where Ambassador and Mrs. Trotsky and the three fliers gave us all a hand shake. Off in an adjoining room were great tables spread with all kinds of Russian goodies. An orchestra and dancing furnished a part of the program. One of the interesting features of this affair was that it was attended not only by those of liberal views but also by a large number of so-called economic royalists and reactionaries.
