"Life" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts. Jesus' words, from Luke, are the Golden Text: "Now that the dead are raised, even Moses showed at the bush, when he calleth the Lord the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. For he is not a God of the dead, but of the living: for all live unto him." Among the Bible citations in the Lesson-Sermon are Paul's words to the Romans: "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose. . . . What shall we then say to these things? If God be for us, who can be against us? . . . Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? . . . Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us." A correlative passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, states: "When the evidence before the material senses yielded to spiritual sense, the apostle declared that nothing could alienate him from God, from the sweet sense and presence of Life and Truth."

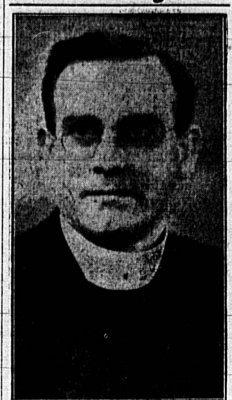

State Revenues Exceed Expenses

SACRAMENTO. (U.P.)—General fund revenues exceeded cash expenditures by \$12,000,000 during the last fiscal year, Controller Harry B. Riley revealed as he pointed to further indications that the state would retire its deficit within a year.

Total cash receipts for the general fund last year amounted to \$164,000,000 while cash disbursements totaled \$152,000,000. Riley issued \$54,000,000 in registered warrants, of which \$41,000,000 are outstanding and will be called next month.

Long Rummy Game Starts DALLAS. (U.P.)—A million-point rummy game, titled by contestants Albert Coarned, 12, and George Haley, 14, as "the longest game of cards ever played in the world," has begun. The boys plan to play five hours a day, divided between mornings and evenings, and finish the game by Nov. 1.
