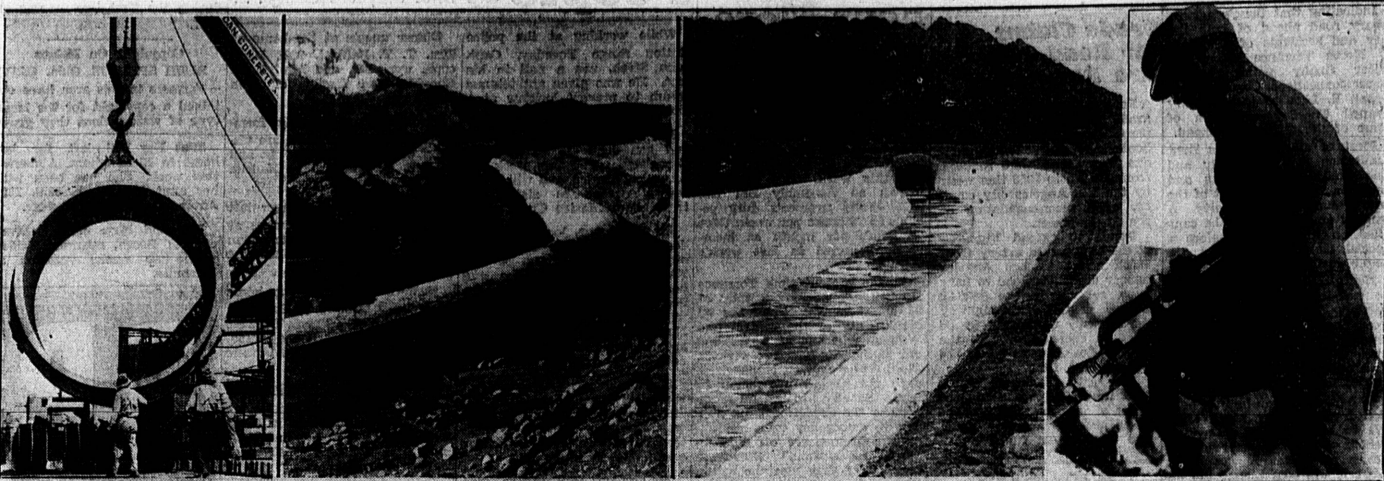

# AQUEDUCT BUILDERS CONQUER DESERT BARRIERS

## Speed Work to Assure Abundant, Everlasting Water For Thirteen Cities in Metropolitan Water District



Undaunted by the blistering desert heat, construction crews on the 392-mile Metropolitan Aqueduct are rapidly bringing to completion most of the tunnel, canal and conduit sections on the giant waterway that will deliver a thousand million gallons of water a day to the cities and areas comprising the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

The big job, which thus far has given employment to more than 32,000 men on Aqueduct construction work and tens of thousands of others in the manufacture of materials and supplies, is being carried forward under the direction of Frank E. Weymouth, General Manager and Chief Engineer of the District.

Of the 108 miles of hard-rock tunnels on the Aqueduct, all have been excavated except four miles on the thirteen-mile San Jacinto tunnel. Despite an increasing overdrift on all local Southern California water basins, the thirteen cities in the Metropolitan Water District are assured, through the Aqueduct, of a guaranteed and an everlasting water supply to support present development and encourage future population growth and industrial expansion. The thirteen District cities are Anaheim, Beverly Hills, Burbank, Compton, Fullerton, Glendale, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Pasadena, San Marino, Santa Ana, Santa Monica, and Torrance.

## FEEDER LINK TO TORRANCE ADVERTISED FOR BIDS

Protection of Southern California cities against the menace of drought drew another step nearer this week when F. E. Weymouth, general manager of the Metropolitan Water District, called for bids on the construction of 18 additional miles in the Metropolitan Aqueduct distributing system.

Connecting to the distribution "upper feeder," now under construction from the Cajalco reservoir to Glendale, at a point in Eagle Rock Canyon, the new work will constitute the western "cross-feeder" of the system. Bids will be opened Sept. 1, on the first 18 miles of this lateral which will serve the cities of Los Angeles, Torrance, Compton

and Long Beach, part of the cities that comprise the Metropolitan Water District.

From the connection in Eagle Rock Canyon, the new cross-feeder will extend in a general southwesterly direction to the intersection of 89th street and Wardsworth avenue, which is three blocks east of Avalon boulevard. The Water District

called for bids on alternative types of pipe line ranging in size from 57 to 50 inches in diameter. Included also was the construction of three tunnels, known as Rockdale, Oakhill and Ascot tunnels, and having a total length of 2,481 feet.

Engineering designs and studies are now in progress on the remaining part of the feeder from 98th street south to serve the Water District cities south of Los Angeles. Present plans call for all construction on the Metropolitan Aqueduct to be completed in 1939.

The work being advertised will bring a total of 322 miles of the 392-mile Metropolitan Aqueduct mile Metropolitan Aqueduct system under construction. Since construction work was started

## UNEMPLOYMENT RESERVES LAW BROADENED IN SCOPE

SACRAMENTO. — Governor Frank F. Merriam has signed two important measures adopted by the 1937 legislature in reference to the Unemployment Reserves Act—namely, reduction of coverage from employers hiring eight or more persons, to those hiring four or more, and adoption of a new benefit structure.

The governor's signature on the bill means that some 50,000 new employers and their employees must pay contributions to the unemployment reserves fund, thereby insuring compensation

benefits to a greater number of California workers. As nearly as can be estimated, 300,000 more employees will be added to the 1,300,000 now covered.

As a result of the bill, the Unemployment Reserves Commission will receive contributions from some 70,000 subject employers in California, and in the neighborhood of 1,600,000 employees.

The new benefit structure in a bill by Assemblyman C. C. Cottrell and others, sets up a definite schedule of payments.
