Deadline Nears for Redemption of Property

Less than six weeks remain for owners of tax-delinquent property to pay their back taxes and redeem their property without payment of penalties, it was pointed out today by H. L. Byram, county tax collector. Sept. 1 is the deadline.

Payments of delinquent taxes for 1936 totaled \$212,865, it was disclosed, bringing the total for the year to \$8,738,410. This is approximately \$400,000 below the \$9,137,476 paid in during the previous fiscal year ending June 30, 1936.

The 10-payment plan for payment of delinquent taxes will be in effect until April 20, 1938, however, by action of the 1937 Legislature, but the moratorium on penalties will not apply when taxes are delinquent only for the year 1936; it was explained by T. E. Tanner, head of the redemption division.

Son Excells Dad in Fishing with Cheap Gear

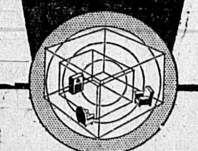

Trout and Sea Fishing Is Good

Big Pine lakes in the High Sierra, five and a half miles from Glacier lodge by trail, are yielding limits of trout from 10 to 16 inches long, according to reports received by The Herald. The best catches are being taken from the Fifth and Black lakes with Grey Hackle, Brown Hackle and Mosquito flies the popular lures.

Big Pine creek is still high and fast, but the water is clear. Good fishing is being enjoyed above the second falls, two miles from the end of the road. Comfortable accommodations are available at Glacier lodge and the Upper Camp. The lodge is reached via the all-paved Owens Valley highway through Lone Pine, thence 11 miles west over a good dirt mountain road. Total distance from Torrance is about 274 miles.

DEEP SEA FISHING REPORTED GOOD

Fishing is fine off Belmont pier, reports the Long Beach office of the National Automobile club. Spot fin, yellow fin and corbina are plentiful. Catches on the live bait boat Klara which operates from the pier, have consisted mainly of barracuda, yellowtail and bass. 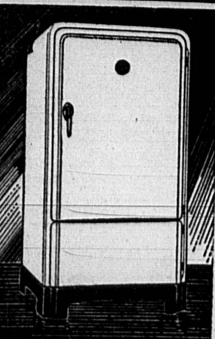
