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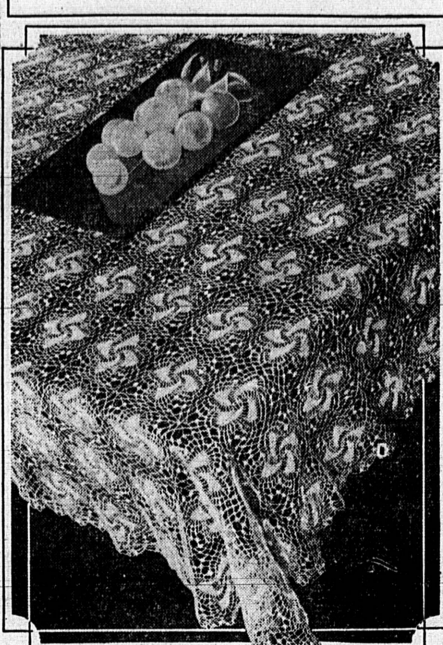


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Maywood Couple Recovering From Burns Here

Recovering from second and third degree burns on their arms and legs, suffered when a dishpan full of cleaning solvent burst into flames Sunday evening at the home in Maywood, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Carson are convalescing at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Humer of 1313 Portola avenue. Mrs. Humer and Mrs. Carson are sisters.

The Maywood couple's arms are still swathed in thick gauze bandages. They said they were cleaning lace curtains in the pan of solvent on their back porch when suddenly the whole pan became a mass of fire. Maywood firemen who investigated stated that they thought the blaze was caused by fumes from the cleaning solution becoming ignited by a small pilot light on a nearby gas heater.

Mrs. Carson had her hands in the solution when it caught fire and her husband, rushing to her rescue, seized the flaming pan and hurled it from the porch, sustaining serious burns on his arms and left leg as he did so. Neighbors aided in smothering the flames with some old rugs. The Carsons were treated at the Maywood hospital. They said they thought the cleaning solvent was non-inflammable.

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Fond Farewell

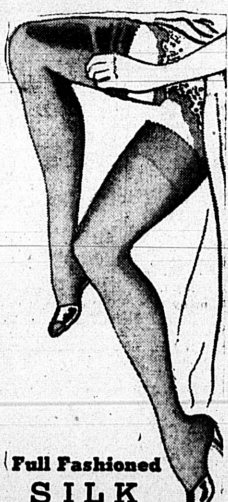

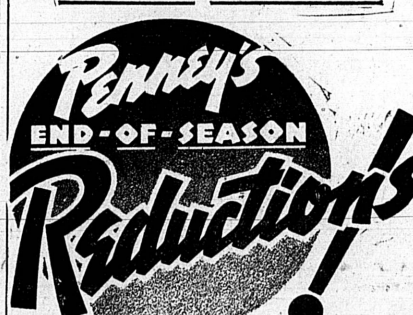

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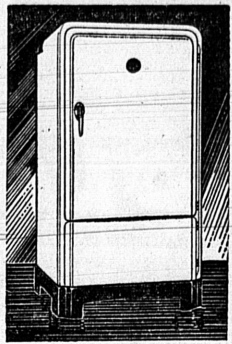


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
