SWIMMING led all sports in popularity in the U. S. last year, according to the United Press report based on the statement from Maj. George W. Braden, national representative of the National Recreation association that 1,675,000 persons participated in that activity under public recreation department auspices, continues the U. P. report.

Softball led regular baseball as a national sport. Braden said that there were 12,819,000 participants in softball in this country last year. This figure does not represent the number of individuals, as in the case of swimming, but the total number of times players participated in the sport. There were 565 softball diamonds opened last year, as compared with 139 hardball diamonds.

Recreation developments in 2,000 cities, Braden said, showed rapid advancement to normal recreational conditions as comparable to the years 1929 and 1930.

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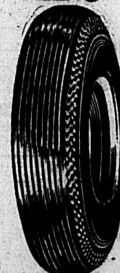
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
