Congressman Colder at the Capitol

WASHINGTON, July 29, Special to The Herald—One of the worst abuses of receiverships and bankruptcy

proceedings has occurred in the state of California, according to the report made by an investigating committee comprised of Senators Ashurst, McAdoo, Van Nuys, Herbert and Austin. These receivers are appointed by Federal Judges of California. This committee report is a revelation of financial debauchery. The assets of the companies for which receivers were appointed were alleged to amount to more than \$473,000, and the debts were slightly over \$161,000,000. The book value of these assets was placed at less than \$200,000,000, or about \$270,000,000 less than the assets claimed. It is very evident that the allegations set out in the petitions under oath were perjured or the receivers were incompetent and wasteful.

Here is the part that should interest the people of Southern California who invested their earnings in building and loan associations, real estate investment companies and fly-by-night oil companies: About four and one-half million dollars was paid to receivers, attorneys, auditors and appraisers. The loss on operations was nearly \$13,000,000. The investigators and creditors received but \$4,664,000 plus. For every dollar that was paid to the general creditors, 96 cents was paid in fees; and, in the case of the receiverships arising before one of the Federal Judges, the sum of \$4,97½ was paid for every dollar received by the investors and creditors.

FIVE FOR ONE . . .
That means that nearly \$5 went to receivers, attorneys, and others, and the holder of stocks or bonds got \$1. What kind of

justice do you call that? These are the facts disclosed from the examination of 207 receiverships over a period of about three years.

It is charged in the case of the Julian Petroleum company, the receivers were allowed compensation of \$210,000 for a period of 18 months, and in addition, the attorneys received the sum of \$173,250. In the Richfield Oil company receivership, an operating loss of over \$10,000,000 was incurred, and at the same time fees of a million and a half dollars were paid to the receiver, his attorneys, auditors and appraisers.

The entire report is a convincing indictment, not only of judges, but of their appointees. It clearly shows the reason why thousands of the citizens of Southern California lost the greater part of their investments and in many cases all of their investments. And all this under the very noses of the Federal judges, themselves. It points out clearly that these proceedings have been not only scandalous and wasteful, but a violation of financial ethics. If the people of Southern California were familiar with all the details of these receiverships, there would be a demand for judicial reform, not only in the Supreme Court, but reaching to all the Federal courts.

BATTLE ROYAL . . .
The House had a battle royal over a bill to authorize the President to appoint not more than six administrative assistants, with a salary of \$10,000 per year. The President is very overworked. His staff at the White House is inadequate. So the Democratic Members supported a bill to give the President some aid and relief.

The Republicans seized upon this as a partisan measure and made a bitter fight against it. They also resorted to dilatory tactics and staged a filibuster by demanding a quorum and roll call. But the Democratic leaders succeeded in shutting off the objectors and the bill was passed by a good majority and now goes to the Senate.

Panel Views of Old N. Y. on Display

A series of panel pictures based on the photograph, "The Toast of New York," is on view for the next two weeks at the Public Library in the exhibit room. Composed of drawings, historical views and still pictures from the motion picture based on the spectacular career of James Fisk, Jr., the display is well worth seeing.

Included are pictures of the old theatres, stock exchange, grand opera house and New York Nabobs of the 1860's such as Commodore Vanderbilt, Josie Mansfield, "Uncle" Daniel Drew, Jay Gould and the excitement-craving Fisk, one of the famous "Robber Barons" of those riotous days.

As a historical exhibit, the panels are exceptional. The pictures trace the advancement of transportation, housing and entertainment. As a publicity feature for the motion picture it advertises the display equal to those of "Romeo and Juliet," "The Plainsman" and other films seen here.

First Concrete Poured On Parker Dam Project

Swung from steel cables stretched across the high walls of Parker Canyon, the first bucket of concrete was poured late last week in the construction of Parker Dam, according to F. E. Weymouth, general manager of the Metropolitan Water District.

Being constructed to divert water into the 392-mile Metropolitan Aqueduct, Parker Dam is located on the Colorado river 150 miles south of Boulder Dam, and is being built under the direction of Frank Crowe, who was also general superintendent of the construction of Boulder Dam.

Dog Show at Park Sunday

The Harbor City Kennel club will hold its fourth annual dog show, with about 450 prize canines on display, Sunday, at the city park ball diamond, starting at 8 a. m. Admission will be charged. Judging will start at 9:30 under American Kennel club rules.

The Harbor City club ordinarily holds its show at Long Beach, but on account of the rabies quarantine there it was decided to hold it this year in Torrance.
