DOG SHOW SUNDAY ATTRACTS MANY SPECTATORS AT PARK

With more than 400 pedigreed dogs of all kinds on display, the Harbor Cities Kennel club show at the city park last Sunday attracted several thousand spectators from many other cities besides Torrance and surrounding communities. The show had entries from Seattle, Denver, Santa Barbara, Beverly Hills and many other localities.

Seven show rings were in operation throughout the day while certified judges passed on the merits of various classes of dogs entered. American Kennel association rules prevailed and in addition to ribbon trophies, silver and gold cups were awarded.

The only local entry was Yap O'Pang of Tse Ho, a nine-month-old cream chow, owned by Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Dayhof of 1521 Cedar avenue. He won first in the novice class on his appearance in this, his second dog show. The Dayhofs (he is employed at the National Supply company) have owned Yap O'Pang for seven months. They intend to start a kennel here in the near future.

Comedian's Dog Wins
A Scottish terrier, Champion Craghaven Clicker, owned by Stuart Erwin, film comedian, was judged best dog in the fourth annual all-breed show. The selection was made by Chris Shuttleworth of North Hollywood, who picked Erwin's entry from among 50 dogs.

A pointer owned by Dr. Rae Evans Smith of Linton, Ore., named Champion Neale Hicon Sensation, won first prize in the sporting dog classification and a German shepherd, Champion Cito A. Aitch, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Sidney P. Heckert of Santa Barbara, was held the best of the working dog group.

A 12-month-old Chow owned by Mr. and Mrs. Cecil J. A. Malbach of Orange won the five-point show to become Orange county's first Chow champion. In his sensational climb to the championship, made in the short period of 12 months, Wulce Brillantine amassed a total of 18 points—three more than is necessary to achieve the coveted championship rating—under seven different judges. Rules set up by the American Kennel association of New York only require wins under three different judges. Wulce Brillantine established a remarkable record. He not only finished in a year's time, but also became a champion at 23 months—the age at which most dogs begin their drive to the championship.
