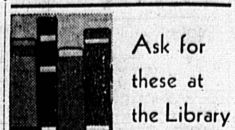

## Ask for these at the Library

**A CARDINAL OF THE MEDICI** by Mrs. Hicks Beach: The story of Ippolito, a Medici, is unfolded against a background of arts, social life, customs and everyday life of the Renaissance. There appear such figures as Raphael, Michelangelo, Cellini as natural as if today. All characters are historical but the bare facts of history have been so veiled by invention that we enjoy a living picture while the story holds the readers' interest for its own sake.

**PARADISE** by Esther Forbes: This book pictures for us the founding of a new England settlement. The author lets us see sympathetically the strain of people adapting themselves to a new land. Here are people of energy and will and full of loneliness as settlers in new lands more than often are. The 17th century in Massachusetts Bay Colony is brought to us with magnificent reality and the historical romance combines the best qualities of several favorite books of the past two years.

**THE NILE** by Emil Ludwig: This is both a travel book and a sort of legendary biography of this river, a maker of civilization and history. Four thousand miles and 6,000 years pour through these pages as we watch the Nile give life to man and meaning to his history. Hundreds of objects are composed into a picture that is impressive but never bewilders with detail. The author can describe anything strongly, sharply—memorably a herd of elephants, the flowers along the blue Nile, an Egyptian statue or a modern power house.

**EAST WIND** by Compton McKenzie: This is the story of a young man's intellectual and emotional development written with dignity and beauty. The account of John Ogilvie and his friends growing into maturity as the 20th century itself comes of age, depicts the spiritual and mental upheaval which is taking place in our present readjustment to the machine age. This is the first book of "The Four Winds of Love" which publishers anticipate will be a great work.

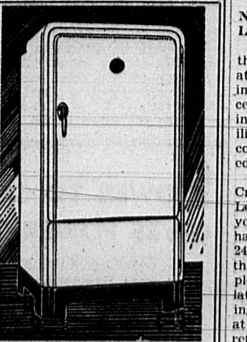
