

3 Boys Escape Serious Injury In Car Crash

Escaping death or serious injuries with only a few bruises to show for their experience, three well-known Torrance youths figured in a spectacular automobile crash shortly before 1 o'clock last Saturday morning.

They were Robert Sleeth, Jr., who was driving his parents' new Pontiac sedan, Robert Trezise and Robert Bischoff.

The young men were driving on Carson Street toward the business district and when they struck the dip in the road near the Legion clubhouse the car got out of control. It crashed into El Prado park at the abrupt curve a hundred feet away, knocked over an ornamental light standard and uprooted a large palm tree before turning over in the park.

Tire-marks on the pavement showed that young Sleeth applied his brakes immediately after crossing the dip. The car was covered by insurance and the damage to city property, estimated by City Engineer Frank R. Leonard at about \$200, is likewise covered by policies carried by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Sleeth of Post avenue.

City Tax Reductions Are Cited As 'Good Examples' to County

While the board of supervisors endeavored to agree upon last-minute changes in the final county budget for 1937-38, they had before them letters from taxpayers in a number of cities in the county where taxes have been reduced this year, and asking the county to follow the example.

Covina city officials pared their city's tax levy four cents to \$1.74 per \$100. Twenty cents of that goes to pay for a sewer system that cannot be used because it has no outlet.

The city of Bell slashed its city's levy 10 cents for this year, bringing it down to 85 cents, one of the lowest rates in the county. Maywood city officials pledged themselves to do likewise.

The Torrance rates are \$1.10 and \$1.07, a reduction of one

cent on property within the original city limits and the same as last year for other districts.

Pomona's levy for 1937-38 will remain the same, although the increase in the assessed valuation of the city will raise \$11,850 more than the same levy produced last year.

Clayton C. Brandt this week called the attention of the supervisors to what had been done in Santa Monica.

"Santa Monica city taxes have been reduced this year, in face of an increased budget, because a larger amount of delinquent taxes has been collected," Brandt wrote. "I hereby enter my protest to any increase in the general county levy."

The new county budget must be adopted on or before August 31.

Auto Fatalities Show Decrease

Fatalities resulting from auto accidents showed a decrease in California for the first time in more than two years. E. Raymond Cato, chief of the state highway patrol, cited highway death figures for July in support of this statement. Statewide figures showed 256 July deaths as compared with 277 in July, 1936.

Cato said warnings cautioning motorists to hold their speed to 50 miles an hour, and an order to "slow poke" drivers to keep their cars moving faster may have contributed to the reduction.

A letter from the Palos Verdes Home association concerning the proposed improvement of Catalina avenue's extension and Elena avenue's continuation to Catalina was read at city council meeting Tuesday night. The association desired an expression from the city in regard to "a tentative agreement by Torrance, Redondo Beach and the county" to make this improvement.

City Engineer Frank R. Leonard pointed out that both streets are outside the Torrance city limits and therefore this municipality was not concerned with the project. They are located in Redondo Beach, he said, and any improvement should be done by that city. He was to write the Palos Verdes group to this effect.
