

Men of Vision Seek Reclamation of Bixby Slough for Dual Purpose

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ity north of Long Beach, to the Board of Supervisors. The officials have referred his proposal, made by Andreani and amply documented and reinforced by facts gathered by both over a period of many years, to C. H. Howell, chief engineer of the County Flood Control District. The latter's report is expected in the near future.

Leonard's project has a more "local" interest than the one suggested by Andreani. The city engineer proposes a drainage plan, utilizing West Basin as an outlet, which would eliminate the annual floods and resultant damage to Anaheim, Piquero, Lomita, Vermont, Normandie and State boulevards and streets and adjoining residential areas. This area has about 300 acres actually under stagnant water remaining at practically the same level in the past dozen years. It is a swamp morass "in the heart of a region that has astounded the world for increment and achievement."

The second factor of the project is Andreani's and while further in the future than the drainage proposal, bears equal interest. The former port official sees the Leonard drainage plan as the "step toward ultimate extension of the tidewater inland."

Would Enlarge Port.

"The northern line of N. W. Slip of West Basin, 500 feet wide, has been left open by the War Department for navigation extension inland," Andreani states, adding "this in reality is the Inner Bay Exception line, that is the demarcation between marketable privately owned and tideland or public trust restricted domain. Immediately north, across the boulevard, is a small basin still subject to tidal action and following that depression northward are about 30.0 acres actually flooded or less than 25 feet above mean sea level and an immense acreage less than 35 feet."

"One of the largest and most successful private shipside warehouses in the land, P. T. & S. Company at Houston, Texas, prides itself on its trucking capacity of 84 cars, phone connections to ships and floor level 35 feet above mean low tide."

"A bascule bridge like or larger and faster working than the one at Badger avenue could carry the boulevard and belt line tracks. Thence east of the Union refinery a continuation of the 500 foot channel could be projected to a basin, 1200 ft. by 800 ft., south of this point and there is provided (gratis drainage of Bixby Slough) as much pierhead as is now available at all the Terminal Island terminals."

Cost Not Prohibitive

"At Anaheim boulevard the contours permit a fixed bridge high enough to clear seagoing fishing vessels. From said new basin south of Anaheim along the slough 17,000 feet to Ocean avenue next to Vermont the 25 foot maximum level would permit very economic dredging of a 150 foot or 200 foot barge canal."

"At certainly not prohibitive cost—the highest points being 40 feet—such a canal could tap the 10-foot Nigger slough near Carson and Vermont or Carson near Avalon or both and pro-

vide miles of industrial light-erage served frontage as far as Torrance and Gardena—and what is perhaps now most imperative thus drain successfully both sloughs and adjacent areas," Andreani claims.

Those are the improvements to which Andreani has been devoting the past several years and which have been given the earnest attention of property owners, city and county officials and industrialists with the result that none has found them faulty. The drainage of Bixby Slough would cost about \$81,500, according to City Engineer Leonard, a man of high professional standing and who has had years of experience in and familiarity with this end of the county.

Could Extend Drain

For that sum, the wasteland of Bixby Slough could be rendered available for industrial or other use—a territory over two miles wide available for industrial or other use—a territory over two miles wide with a depth of five miles to the basin. And in addition, the flood menace of the years would be forever abated.

"With little additional expense, the Keystone-Lomita area could also be drained," he says. "While I do not propose it at the present time, we could alter the Flood Control District plans and for a very reasonable figure extend the drainage canal to effectively include Nigger Slough-Gardena Valley drainage to Alondra Park, all entirely in the Shoestring region."

The proportionate cost to the county under a WPA project would be amply repaid in short order as several industries have signified their intention to locate in the Slough—if and when it is drained," he declared. "I won't forecast what the establishment of those plants would mean to our industrial future but I cannot desist from calling attention to the value to the county and the state, in fact the entire Southwest, of initiating by such a step a movement toward extending tidewater inland. This would eventually create a 'Port District' to include a larger part of the area benefited by the Harbor and launching essential cooperation in Port activities between the city and the county."
