STONES AWAKE by Carleton Beals

The man who perhaps understands Mexico and Mexicans better than any other living American writer presents a tremendously moving story of peasant's tenacious struggle for land, education, and freedom in a country overrun with cruelty, ignorance and greed. Few readers with little previous knowledge of Mexico will realize how thoroughly authentic this story is. It is all the Revolutions of Mexico from the rise of Madero to the present administration of Cardenas. It is popularized modern history; the most exciting history you could read. In the story of an Indian woman Esperanza, the novel portrays how the cry for land and liberty became heard, how the cross purposes and selfish ambitions of politicians and generals deterred but never fully stifled it.

BOY IN BLUE by Royce Brier

An outstanding story among the large crop of Civil War books which have followed on the success of "Gone With the Wind." What the Civil War meant to an untutored Indiana farm boy in the Northern Army; a simple and realistic woman's-eye view of the vicious fighting around Chickamauga as it might have seemed to a mere private in this story. With its unexaggerated fictional treatment of the war it succeeds in building the principal character into a memorable typical figure, "a man with ideals who valued above all else his life and his happiness with the Southern girl he had come to love."

Zona Gole's new story LIGHT WOMAN

needs little introduction. A witty and entertaining novel of small-town family life creating an unforgettable picture. In this story of a young woman who upsets the tranquil conventionalities of a small town family the author shows great powers of insight into human character and ability to picture manners and morals.

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
