He graduated from Northwestern University's School of Medicine in 1906 and served a one-year internship at St. Luke's hospital in Chicago. Then he returned to York to begin his practice. Within a short time he was serving as a clinical instructor in pathology at the University of Nebraska School of Medicine at the same time. He also formed the Sons and The Sons of America, the latter being still a progressive youth organization in Nebraska.

It was his keen interest in boys that led him to organize those two groups and he began his observations of the problems of adolescent youth which resulted in his writing several book-length treatises and a number of other articles on corrective measures to insure a proper heritage for the nation's young men.

This effort was climaxed about five years ago when his boys' work program, a comprehensive outline for physical and mental development of youth to adult life, was endorsed by Rotary International.

On June 30, 1909, he married Miss Mina Martha Ashton at Centralia, Washington. His sons were born at York, Neb. The family moved to Torrance in 1924. Immediately upon reaching Torrance, Dr. Shidler entered partnership with Dr. Lancaster and together they constantly enlarged and improved their offices and facilities. This partnership was terminated Jan. 1, 1936, when Dr. Shidler's health began to fail. But the two medical men continued to share the office facilities in their practice.

Fought Dread 'Polio'
Dr. Shidler was one of the charter members of the Torrance Rotary club and was twice elected its president, serving in 1928-29 and again in 1935-36. It was thru his efforts, club members agree, that the service organization was able to maintain its membership and hold true to its traditions thruout the doldrums of the depression which brought oblivion to many an organization. With the coming of better times, the physician guided Rotary here toward its present enviable position in the community life.

He was also a Mason and belonged to the Elks and Knights of Pythias lodges in Nebraska.

He also served as president of the Nebraska Alumni association. Only his most intimate professional acquaintances knew that Dr. Shidler was the first man in the United States to quarantine for poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis). This was during his practice in Nebraska. As result of his, at that time, "arbitrary" action, he received much favorable comment from American and European medical authorities.

Devoted to Church
Spiritual welfare was closely allied with physical and mental attainments in the keen mind of Dr. Shidler and he followed the precepts of the Great Physician with his great interest in the growth of St. Andrew's Episcopal church.

He was senior warden for several years and served as superintendent of the Sunday school. St. Andrew's owes him much for his attention to the progress of the parish and he was always eager to serve the church in any capacity he could.

The Right Reverend R. B. Gooden, Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Los Angeles, assisted by Rev. Thomas R. Marshall, resident vicar, officiated at the funeral service yesterday afternoon. The body lay in state, surrounded by a multitude of floral offerings, previous to the time of service. Cremation followed.

County to Lift Street Bonds
Negotiations for the purchase of all of the outstanding bonds of A. and I. District No. 217, formed for the improvement of Amelia street, near Torrance in the Keystone area, were nearing completion this week following adoption of a resolution by the board of supervisors.

The supervisors adopted the recommendation of the county special assessment relief committee. The Griffith company is to assemble all of the bonds outstanding, and deliver them to the county, for which one warrant shall be drawn, payable to the Griffith Company. The Griffith Company, it was understood, purchased the bonds that were voted in order to finance the improvement.

A total of \$30,330 is being paid for the outstanding bonds, which have a face value of \$43,388. The supervisors had previously set aside \$19,288 for relief of the taxpayers in the district, and this sum is being used for the purchase, together with \$11,042 in funds not assigned to the credit of any particular district.

Contract Let for Major Step in Huge Project

Amounting to \$2,361,581, a contract for the construction of an additional 18 miles of the Metropolitan Aqueduct distributing system has been awarded by directors of the Metropolitan Water District.

Bringing a total of 322 miles of the 392-mile aqueduct system under construction, the new feeder line will advance aqueduct construction into the heart of the water district area. Connecting to the aqueduct "upper feeder" in Eagle Rock Canyon, this cross-lateral will extend southwest through Los Angeles to 98th street in the vicinity of Avalon boulevard.

Construction work in this line is expected to get under way next month and will mark another major step in the task of delivering a billion gallons of Colorado River water daily to the thirteen Southern California cities that comprise the Metropolitan Water District.

"Open Work" Resumes
Serving the cities of Los Angeles, Compton, Torrance and Long Beach, the new line will form the western cross-feeder of the aqueduct distributing system. Constructed of welded steel pipe with special exterior and interior coatings, the water line will have a diameter of 54 inches.

On the eastern end of the aqueduct, at the Colorado River, construction work was resumed this week on the intake and Gene pumping plants. This work has been suspended during the summer months because of the intense heat. With the coming of cooler weather, "open work" construction on other desert sections of the aqueduct will be resumed about Oct. 1.

Progress reports indicate that the giant water supply project, which crosses the entire state of California, is now more than 65 percent completed and is expected to be placed in operation in 1939.

Future Farmers to Have Exhibit

The Torrance high school chapter of Future Farmers of America will again be represented by a pen-of-pullets in the Los Angeles County Fair egg production contest at Pomona starting tomorrow. Wilbur Franklin trapped ten birds in his flock of Australorps with records which give promise of a high rank at the finish.

A feature booth representing a small farm home has been constructed by Marshall Franklin, chapter president, with the help of other members. Joe Kallpa, Masaharu Hata, and Wilbur Franklin will exhibit vegetable products raised in connection with their work in vocational agriculture classes this year, and Condon, Franklin and Harold Trezise will exhibit poultry.

Oil Worker Files Bankruptcy Petition

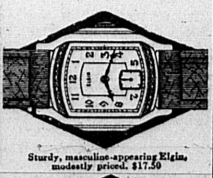
