ness or trade groups, chambers of commerce, credit bureaus, unions and other community organizations to each other and the city itself.

"I want to point out that this subject, especially on the issue of labor unions, will be non-controversial. We plan to enlist the aid of representative men and women of Torrance to help us make this subject of particular local interest and application," Elison declared.

**To Learn Expression**

The next unit to be studied by the graduating class will be that of the social arts. While this may partly overlap into the instruction and consideration of family relations, Principal Elison believes that it will be of benefit in regard to examination of recreational facilities, their location, expense, use and purpose; participation in social affairs and the problems of public and private etiquette.

The fourth unit will be devoted to the oral arts, which Principal Elison explains: "Simply means how one can best make oneself understood in conversation and expression. It is a common fact that many adults cannot express themselves to good advantage on such important occasions as seeking employment; speaking in public, grasping the basic thought of what a speaker is trying to present."

**Select Special Teachers**

Asked if this would include the art of proposing marriage, Elison laughed and said that as yet the school system had not developed such a course and that "I guess that art will have to be developed individually."

Instructors for the Senior Basic course will be chosen, the principal said, from among members of the high school faculty who are interested in the subjects and who have shown their ability to give such instruction and by their contact with the community and home life. It would be of no benefit, he said, to put a teacher with little or no conception of Torrance business or industrial problems to teaching the section covered by occupational orientation.
