Street Blocked Off

There were baskets and boxes of fine groceries, bridge and table lamps, a silk and wool sweater, a camera, motor oil, a beautiful potted fern, toilet sets, jewelry, a waffle iron, a nationally-advertised pipe and a carpenter's saw. Two blankets were "sold" and a pair of live chickens added their squawks to the laughter of the crowd. Other articles included a can of paint, a pair of bedroom slippers, an electric fan, card table and decks of cards and a case of liniment.

The major gift, auctioned as the final attraction, was a Nesco electric cooker, retail value \$22.50. Bidding for this valuable award started with a rush and reached a high peak before it was finally "knocked down" to O. W. Johnson of 2004 Carson street.

Powerful flood lights, furnished by the Torrance fire department, illuminated the truck from which Auctioneer Brooks conducted the Dividend Dough event. Sartori avenue in front of the theatre was blocked off by Officers Willard Haslam and Percy Bennett to allow the crowd to stand in safety while the bidding was in progress.
