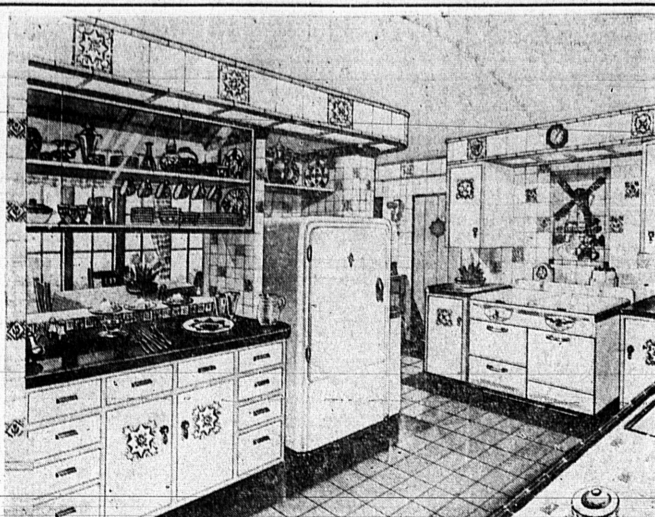


All-Gas Kitchen Shows Dutch Influence

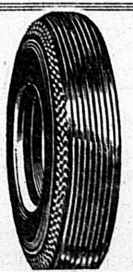
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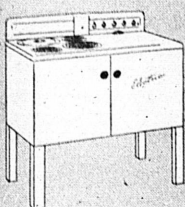

Asking "what good will it do me to be in the community as a priest if I do not point out one of the fundamental essentials for a better Torrance, a better state and nation," Rev. Father Joseph V. Fitzgerald in an interview for The Herald expressed the following ideas.

St. Andrews Has Junior Choir

The junior choir took part in a service of worship for the first time at St. Andrew's Episcopal church last Sunday. The choir is composed of pupils in the school and at present numbers 18 boys and girls. Mothers of choir members are helping make vestments. In time it is hoped to have a junior church service which will compare with the senior service at 11 o'clock.

The junior choir is augmented by the boy servers' league. Members of this group serve as cross and flag bearers in both Sunday school and church services. They also assist at the altar in communion services. Eight boys are now regularly taking part.

Protect Children BOLZANO, Italy (U.P.)—A hotel here which refused to take in an Italian couple with four children has been closed for "action hostile to the state."

Believing that Father Fitzgerald has a subject worthy of deep consideration, The Herald publishes his words in full and extends with other pastors, to other laymen the privilege of responding at the same length to the ideas expressed by the pastor of the Church of the Nativity or comments on other local problems as they see fit.

"Authority is essential and fundamental for the welfare of society," he said. "Without it we drift to disunion and eventual chaos. In business, in the home, in churches, in schools and government we must be guided by an authority set up for the welfare of that particular entity; one authority that has the right to say 'this is right and this is wrong' to demand from the individual to do one thing and avoid another."

To Give Instruction

"Individualism is opposed to authority but the latter is the bond of security, of unity and progress as opposed to the former or the right of the individual to think and act as he or she thinks fit without regard for the rest of society. The lack of this fundamental principle is at the root of all troubles both spiritual and social. Today children forget and are indifferent to the authority of parents, the parents and children have lessened the authority of the school and a large number have long since refused to be guided by the authority of the church in spiritual matters."

"He that shall not hear you shall not hear Me; he that despiseth you despiseth Me" and "He that is of God heareth the word of God; therefore you hear them not because you are not of God." We must come back to the authority of the church and state. We must be willing to subject ourselves to that authority, to teach our children by word and example the importance of it in religious matters, in the home, the school and in the state.

"Therefore obedience to authority must supplant individualism or the right of the individual to think and act for himself in matters affecting humanity as a whole. I propose, to give instructions along these lines and the principles of the Catholic church at the Rectory every Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock and I cordially invite all interested Catholics and non-Catholics to attend and participate in the discussion."

NEW YORK (U.P.)—The clerk in Darwin, Australia, Supreme Court, uses this form of oath: "Now listen. Want you talka true feller and tella big feller boss on top (the judge). Talk loud altogether men in court want to hear you. Talk true all-a-time, not what other black boy bin tellum you. 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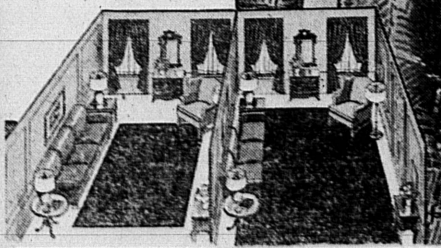
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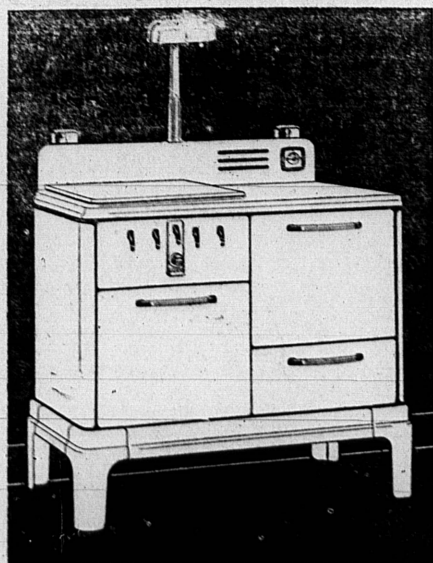
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
