Offers Decorating Advice
Scarcely a woman who at-
tended the session who did not
express amusement at one or
more of the speaker's remarks.
Wileman, who has traveled from
Virginia to Maine as a lecturer
and consultant on home decora-
tions, instructed: "The most im-
portant trend in home furnish-
ing is the introduction of color.
Walls need not be white; they
may be coral, light brown, egg
shell but they must be smooth.
Use indirect lighting and choose
lamps with care."

"Do not use misfit rugs and
carpets and definitely never cut
the corners off your rooms with
furniture. Group your furni-
ture, select draperies (not
drapes) that harmonize with the
other furnishings and tho your
home be modest, it will be
restful."

Mrs. J. B. Shaw, first vice-
president and program chairman
introduced the speaker. Mrs. H.
J. Barrington, modishly attired
in all black with shoulder cor-
sage of gardenias, presided at
the luncheon meeting and after-
