Pineapple Adds Flavor Touch

Simple desserts for this season of the year are easy to prepare when canned pineapple furnishes the flavoring that blends so nicely with other foods. An ever-so-easy dessert to prepare is one with left-over plain cake. Arrange layers of cake (thin of course) with layers of crushed pineapple and repeat until a sufficient amount has been prepared for the family. Pour soft custard over all of it. Soft custard is just milk thickened with egg yolks and seasoned ever so slightly with sugar and vanilla. Two egg yolks and one tablespoon of sugar are sufficient for one cup of milk. Cook until the custard coats the spoon. Allow the dessert to stand a little while before serving. It is best served cold.

Instead of using custard, arrange just one layer of cake and cover with crushed pineapple and then arrange cut marshmallows over the top. Place in the oven just long enough to brown the marshmallows. Children like these two desserts.

Colorful Sauce

While eggs are still plentiful and not so costly as during the winter, try this dessert: Beat six eggs, add one cup bread crumbs, dash of salt, four tablespoons melted butter, two cups crushed pineapple, and one cup of sugar. Mix well and pour into a greased baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) until firm or about 35 minutes. Serve hot or cold with hard sauce. Instead of hard sauce, cream or top milk would be good.

Red pineapple sauce is just the thing to serve with ice cream or with such puddings as bread, cottage, or cornstarch (you know that kind grandma used to make and turn out of a cup). Mash one cup of strawberries, add one cup of sugar and two cups of crushed pineapple and cook slowly for about 30 minutes, stirring frequently to prevent sticking on the bottom of the pan. You will find this sauce easy to prepare, full of flavor, color and character, and one you will want to add

Place first slice of ham in buttered baking pan. Sprinkle lightly with brown sugar and cover with thinly sliced apples. Add second slice of ham and sprinkle with brown sugar. Add a second layer of apples and finally top with third slice of ham. Sprinkle with brown sugar. Heat in moderate oven 350° approximately 45 minutes.
