### Cities' Health Facts Okayed By Supervisors

New contracts between a half dozen cities and the county health department were approved this week by the board of supervisors. The contracts provide that the county shall enforce state health laws within the cities, and perform such other duties as the city authorizes the department to do.

These vary in most of the cities and towns. All contracts are made on the basis of one fiscal year. Cities for which new contracts were approved this week were Torrance, Azusa, San Fernando, San Gabriel, El Segundo and Whittier.

Some windows that receive a washing after each annual "spook night" and many others glistened with pristine cleanliness as result of vigorous scrubbing throughout the city this week as business men and housewives endeavored to erase traces of traditional Hallowe'en activity.

Merchants nursed aching arm and back muscles as they recalled that the Friday and Saturday night prowling by Hallowe'en youngsters was: "Not as bad as it used to be but still is bad enough."

Many business men appeared in front of their downtown establishments Sunday morning, welding brushes and buckets of water in order to have their fronts visible by the time they opened for trade again Monday.

Residents could be observed on individual hunts for missing garbage cans, front gates, signs and backyard impediments which had been spirited off during the Saturday night festivities.

Some streets looked pretty bad with garbage and refuse scattered about with reckless abandon but on the whole Hallowe'en passed here without an undue amount of property damage.

All members of the police department were on duty Saturday night and Street Superintendent William Gaseoigne had a number of his men on guard at the city park and other municipal sites.

### Felony Charge Reduced; Sutton Gets Suspension

On the recommendation of the deputy district attorney who came here to prosecute the case, the felony theft charge placed against Walter M. Sutton following his alleged participation in selling 47 pounds of copper belonging to the Columbia Steel company to a Long Beach junk-dealer was reduced to petty theft in City Judge Robert Lessing's court last Friday.

Sutton, who had been held in jail in default of \$1,500 bail since Oct. 22, plead guilty to the lesser count. He was given a six-months' suspended sentence on condition that he leave at once for Redwood City where he said he had a job waiting for him with an uncle.

Because the felony charge against Sutton was minimized, local police are not attempting to locate Leslie Fredericks, who resided at 1346 1/2 Engracia avenue until Oct. 22. Fredericks was said to be the driver of the truck that conveyed the steel company's copper to Long Beach where the shipment was traced by Long Beach police.

### Mrs. Klusman Hurt When Car Hits Parked Auto

Following emergency treatment at the Georgia Street receiving hospital in Los Angeles, Mrs. Kathryn Klusman of 2018 Carson street, wife of this city's former mayor, was given additional medical attention at Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital last Thursday for injuries received in a Los Angeles automobile accident.

William Klusman, altho badly shaken up and in a highly nervous condition, was unhurt. He said that the accident occurred when he struck a parked car in returning to Torrance. Klusman told hospital attendants that he was traveling at a moderate rate of speed and did not know how his car managed to get over on the wrong side of the street to hit the stationary machine.

Mrs. Klusman was thrown against the windshield and suffered a bad cut on her forehead when the glass shattered. When she fell forward her right arm was fractured.

Never Asked WPA Aid, Town's Claim for Fame

REAMSVILLE, Kas. ## Aid to Veterans and Service Men Is Red Cross Job

"The approach of Armistice Day, which marks the official opening of the Red Cross Roll Call, rivets attention on the large task of assisting the veterans and their families, and caring for the problems of the men in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard, which the National Red Cross does each year," said Mrs. Flora McDonald, of the local Red Cross yesterday.

"During the last fiscal year Red Cross workers gave assistance in 315,283 cases which came to their attention, these cases covering the needs of ex-service men or their families and present-day service men and their families. Disabled war veterans or their widows and orphans in large numbers need the assistance of the Red Cross in securing pensions or other government benefits. Sick and disabled veterans come to the Red Cross for assistance in entering government hospitals, or for help in preparing claims for adjusted compensation."

Mrs. McDonald also is informed that the Red Cross now has Hospital and Recreation Service workers in 10 government hospitals in the Pacific Territory. During the year it established a medical social work program in the Naval Dispensaries at Long Beach and San Pedro. The Red Cross Roll Call will continue until Thanksgiving Day.
