Catholic Bazaar Next Thursday

Public Housing Help Sought

Seeking to eliminate slum conditions within the county despite the failure of Governor Merriam to sign state legislation which would have enabled local governments to sponsor such undertakings, the Los Angeles county board of supervisors this week requested philanthropic-minded citizens to assist in providing homes for the very poor.

Supervisor John Anson Ford was author of a resolution adopted by the board empowering the supervisors to receive bequests for this purpose and instructing various county experts and departments to cooperate in making plans for slum clearance and for the creation of model home districts "or in any other fashion that a prospective donor to this cause may desire."

According to Ford, more than 7,000 indigent families whose support is provided by the county are living in homes or shacks of various degrees of dilapidation.
