SWERVES TRUCK TO AVOID CRASH; AGED MAN HURT

Attempting to avoid a possible collision with a Los Angeles police car at 107th and Avalon boulevard, Nolan Beadle, truck driver for the M & M Trucking and Cementing company of this city, swerved his heavily-loaded tractor truck and semi-trailer Tuesday afternoon into the curb. When the assignment of stop cocks spilled one of them struck John Hukell, 78, of Los Angeles, breaking a bone in his left leg.

Hukell and Driver Beadle, whose right hand and left arm were lacerated in the accident, were treated at the Georgia Street receiving hospital. Witnesses of the accident commended the truck driver for his quick action in avoiding what might have been a collision with the police car, according to reports.

The loaded trailer was being driven south on Avalon to deliver a shipment to the National Supply company from Los Angeles. At the intersection of Avalon, Beadle said he saw the police car spurt out east on 107th from making a boulevard stop and he twisted the wheel to head his vehicle into the curb. The trailer tipped over on its side, dumping the load of stop cocks and then the tractor pulling the trailer hit a pole, causing the trailer to right itself.

One small piece of steel from the load struck the aged Hukell on the left leg, fracturing a bone.

Pioneer Developer Succumbs Sunday at L. A. Home
Southern California this week mourned the loss of A. P. Johnson, pioneer developer who died Sunday at his Los Angeles home, 1001 South Westmoreland avenue, and for whom funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon from Immanuel Presbyterian church.

The 94-year-old business leader was the oldest member of the board of directors of the Union Oil Company, and had spent 78 years in California. He is survived by his widow, two sons and three daughters. Despite his advanced age, Mr. Johnson had personally managed the business affairs of the O. T. Johnson Corporation, involving considerable real estate in Los Angeles county, including the Western Avenue Golf course and business properties in downtown Los Angeles, until the past few months. Burial was at Rosedale Cemetery.
