Tartar Coach, Losing 9 Regulars, Starts Work on Training '38 Grid Candidates at High School

TARTAR CAGE SQUADS LACK VET PLAYERS

Coach Bert Merrill is building his varsity basketball team at the Torrance high school around three players who saw action in Class A games last year. All three were guards in the 1936-37 campaign but Merrill is shifting one, David Powell, to center and another, Wilbur Franklin, to forward. The third, Harold Clemmer, is holding his old position.

Bob Klink is getting a try-out at the other guard spot and Don Moser is at forward. Both are inexperienced and the varsity team development to date has been slow with the squad showing much better offensive strength than defense. Merrill has the following former B-lettermen out for the varsity squad: Junior Richardson and Addison Smith, forwards; W. L. Priest, John Fess and Lester Stanley, guards. Others on the squad are Harold Masse, guard, and Art Woodcock.

C's, D's Unknown

Merrill's B team has been developing exceptionally fast considering that four out of the five who will start have had no previous basketball training. The same team will be back for one or two years to come. Players who have shown special interest in the casaba game are Bill Buckley, guard; Marvin Lee, center; Bob Yancey and Bill Nagel, forwards. Lettermen advanced from the Cees to the Bees are Tommy Wilkes, Melvin Benner, Bill Ritchie, Jean Bordeaux and Harvey Abrahamson. Hata Masahara, guard, is the only Bee letterman holding over from last year's team, and Marian Keating is a forward up from the Dees squad. NEW MARINE BASKETBALL SCHEDULE DOUBLES GAMES

Not until San Pedro high school's athletic director Henry had emphatically declared that the Marine league basketball schedule should provide for a double round of games, as favored by a majority of the Marine schools, did William G. Lopez, L. A. city schools sports arbiter, consent to the enlarged season. Monday he announced a six-game schedule for three schools and seven games for two schools, a set-up which nullified the previously announced game assignments.

However, Coach Bert Merrill of Torrance high is not satisfied with the line-up for the Tartar fives. Both Torrance and Narbonne are listed for bye dates on Feb. 4 and Merrill wants his squads to play the Gauchos on that date, thus making the Tartars' casaba season seven games.
