

Famous Bullfrog Dies

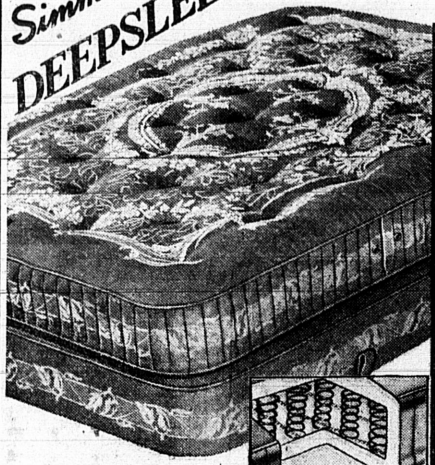

Recession Said Slight in County

Despite a general tendency of business to reflect the recent recession, the month of November was marked by the entrance of 16 new factories in Los Angeles and vicinity and expansions of 13 plants. This is slightly lower than the rate of increase prior to November, especially in the matter of expansions.

Chief "white spot" in the report circulated by the L. A. Chamber of Commerce for the county board of supervisors is postal receipts, which reached the highest November level in the history of the post office.

Foreign trade was an outstanding factor, with the gain for the first 11 months of the year amounting to 23 percent over the same period last year and November's increase amounting to \$5,000,000 in value and 150,000 tons more than the same month a year ago.

Bank Debts Gain
Agriculture was helped by a favorable harvesting weather and crop prices and movements were good, with livestock conditions encouraging.

Under classification of manufacturing, aircraft, petroleum and motion pictures showed only slight effects of a recession. Retail trade is responding to stimulus of the approaching holidays, but may fall below last year's mark for the period.

Bank debits, which for the first eleven months of this year show a 10 percent gain over last year, were, in November, three percent below November of 1936.

The report pointed out that during October, Los Angeles county was the only area of the state to show a gain in industrial employment.

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
