

Stolen Car Used by Thieves Who Raided Yards

The license plates to Conrad Benz's car which were stolen the night of December 19 from the machine while it was in the home garage at 2815 Andree avenue, were located on a stolen car discovered by deputy sheriffs late last week near Carson and Alameda streets. Another set of stolen plates, in addition to Benz's and the right ones to the machine were found in the car.

Deputy sheriffs also reported they found five dead Rhode Island Red hens in the car, a coupe. This indicated that the machine had been used by chicken thieves who raided five local yards Dec. 19 and made off with eight turkeys, 73 hens, two roosters and six rabbits, valued at about \$136.

No trace to the identity of the chicken-car thieves has been uncovered as yet, although local officers have given the thefts considerable attention. Further investigations will be made, according to Police Chief G. M. Calder.

1938 FULL OF POLITICS

An almost continuous whirl of political activity in this and other sections of the state is promised for 1938, with primaries and elections for the naming of office-holders from United States Senator to township justice of the peace.

An election calendar issued this week by Registrar of Voters William M. Kerr shows the year sprinkled with dates for final days of registration, filing of nomination papers, primaries, elections and special elections. Outstanding political dates of the year are the general primary on August 30 and the general election on November 8.

In addition to United States Senator William G. McAdoo, whose term expires at the end of 1938, Los Angeles County is to elect eight Congressmen. The term of Congressman Charles J. Cullen of this district is among those expiring.

Assessor's Job Open
A state senatorship, now held by Culbert L. Olson, is one of the offices to be contested for in this county as are the assembly seats of 30 Los Angeles County representatives in the State's lower legislative house. Incumbent from this district is Assemblyman Fred Reaves.

There are 21 seats on the Superior Court bench to be voted upon, including three now vacant. In 28 townships, justices of the peace must run again or retire from office, including Frank Carrell, sitting in this district.

The terms of Supervisor Herbert C. Legg and John Anson Ford, of the First and Third districts, respectively, of Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz and of County Assessor Ed W. Hopkins expire. Hopkins has announced he will retire, while Legg is expected to make the race for the Democratic nomination for governor.

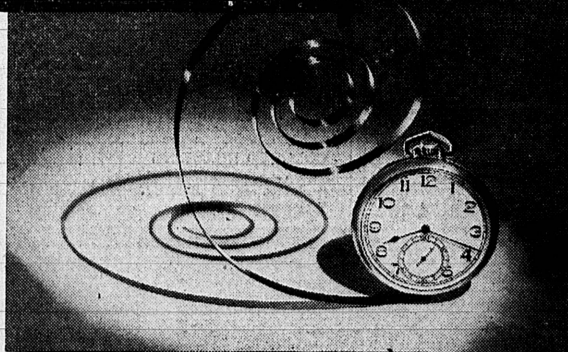
