

## Drainage Ditch Into Slough Turned Down

Flood control engineers this week turned thumbs down on the request of the O. T. Johnson corporation asking that the ditch connecting Johnson lake with Nigger Slough be enlarged to carry the water away from its property faster.

"This work may put more water into Nigger Slough, or it

may put the same amount there quicker," Chief Engineer C. H. Howell stated. "Therefore, it may increase the present serious disabilities of the Nigger Slough area. It is recommended that action be deferred until some betterment can be worked out for the Nigger Slough area which will provide for the increased load from Johnson Lake."

## ONE CRASH YULE NIGHT

Only one automobile accident and injury to one person, Zeb Masters, 21, of 2223 Lomita boulevard, married the Christmas holidays here. Young Masters was injured at 10:45 Christmas Eve when the car in which he was riding, driven by Joe Burkhard, Jr., of 2003 Redondo-Wilmington road, Lomita, overturned at Torrance boulevard and Maple street.

Burkhard was said to have been traveling at a high rate of speed—too fast to negotiate the curve in the roadway at that intersection—according to a witness, H. Haworth, of 1627 Greenwood street. The car overturned approximately 200 feet east of the intersection and came to a stop on the north side of Torrance boulevard, Sergeant Frank Schumacher reported.

Masters was taken to Torrance Memorial hospital by H. R. Rowe in the latter's car. After first aid treatment for serious cuts and bruises he was allowed to go home. Burkhard told police he believed he was traveling about 40 miles an hour but Witness Haworth estimates his speed at considerably faster.

## COUNCIL IN SHORT MEET

Passage of a resolution of intention to form the Torrance Municipal Water District No. 2 in North Torrance, a report on the city finances and a decision to hold up the proposed adoption of an ordinance regulating and licensing "bookie" betting establishments here featured the short meeting held by the city council Tuesday night.

The date for the final hearing on the proposed \$8,244.88 water system for which property Arlington avenue between 166th and 182nd streets will be included in a special assessment district is Jan. 25. City Engineer R. Leonard prepared a voluminous report on the project which included data on the plans and specifications of the water system which will be connected to the Moneta Mutual Water company's mains, estimate of the cost, and a diagram of the assessment district.

Councilman Robert Deininger submitted a financial report prepared by City Treasurer Scott Ludlow and verified by City Auditor C. J. Rambo. This showed that the following funds were on deposit and amply secured by government bonds at the Torrance National bank: \$65,367.27 in the general fund; \$529.91 in the administrative account; \$20,177.81 in the Municipal Water Dist. No. 1 fund and \$1,009.16 in the P.W.A. bond interest and redemption account, or a total of \$87,184.15. On deposit in the Bank of America, also fully secured, was "approximately" \$37,300, Ludlow reported.

W. Rufus Page secured the first permit to operate a trailer camp (on Western avenue) under the ordinance recently adopted regulating such establishments. The General Petroleum corporation submitted a check for \$317.07 representing two percent of the gross receipts derived from its pipeline franchise between Nov. 1, 1936, and Oct. 31, 1937.

The "bookie" ordinance under which the city would collect \$1,800 per betting establishment each year was held up on City Attorney C. T. Rippey's suggestion because their legality was frowned on in a recent District Court of Appeals ruling which is now being taken to the state supreme court. If the adverse decision is overruled, the city will proceed with the adoption of the regulatory and licensing statute.

## Difference in Car Plate Numbers Holds Man in Jail

Because he was found to be driving a car whose license plates did not correspond to the registration slip, Ralph M. Best, 30, Los Angeles chemist, was held overnight in the city jail here after his arrest early Sunday morning. He had been stopped by Officers Tolson and Perkin for driving without a tail-light. Best admitted that he was out on probation from being involved in a bad check charge in Los Angeles. The discrepancy in license plates was explained to the full satisfaction of local authorities by Best's employer and friends. He was released Monday morning.

## No Yule Dinner Needed at Jail

"We had only one man in jail Christmas Day but he was bailed out before we had to serve him a lonely turkey dinner behind the bars," Capt. John H. Stroh reported Sunday. The sole arrestee was Ben Townsend, 28, 21205 Grace street, who was picked up at Elm and Carson streets for driving while intoxicated and no driver's license. He was released on \$150 bail to appear for trial this week.
