L. A. Grabs Big
Share of County
Gas Tax Funds

Los Angeles city has received twice as much from gasoline tax funds during the past ten years as have the other 43 cities of the county, according to statistics compiled today by the county road department.

Los Angeles has received \$19,734,000, as compared to the \$9,083,000 received by the other cities, the compilation, prepared for Deputy County Counsel Harold W. Kennedy showed.

Total amount allocated to the county during the past 10 years was shown to be \$46,650,000, of which the 44 cities received \$29,600,000. Unincorporated areas of the county received \$17,000,000, and part of this was used for administrative costs.

With C. B. Patton, Main purchased 35 acres at Sepulveda and Ocean this week where two producing wells by Texaco are operating.

Patton is prepared to deepen a hole off Sepulveda and Pennsylvania from 3,750 to 5,000 feet and is putting up another derrick 150 feet southwest from his original deep sand job. This bore will also be sunk to 5,000 feet. Watching Patton with great interest are his two brothers, H. H. and D. S. Patton, who recently arrived in Southern California from Wichita, Kansas.

One of the operators who has never lost faith in the field is F. C. Kelly and he has taken over Richfield's No. 6 at 233rd and Narbonne for reconditioning. Kelly Oil will deepen an old well on Pennsylvania and Guy Kelly has moved in machinery to deepen Pan-American's McBride No. 1, it is reported.

The Wooler Oil Corporation of Long Beach is deepening its No. 5 well at Cypress and Madara and has taken over Texaco's Bush No. 33 at the southeast corner of Pennsylvania and Sepulveda. C.C.M.O.'s No. 33 is flowing with high gravity crude at Sepulveda and Cedar and No. 34 is continuing to show excellent production, according to information available yesterday in the field.

It is also reported that Gen. Marcoux and associates have acquired U. S. Oil and Royalties No. 18 at Pepper and Pennsylvania and will deepen at once. Albertson Oil has taken over the old D. P. Peyton well at 235th near Narbonne.

7 was sent from the Long Beach distributing agency for Lederle Laboratories by special messenger, wires and phone calls began to hum and before sundown mail transport planes were winging new supplies to all parts of the country.

This air mail service was provided by the Laboratories without cost and the expense was more than \$200, according to information learned here. Pneumonia serums (and some time this month) these will be available for all 32 types of the disease, covering 95 percent of all pneumonias are at present expensive—ranging from \$25 to \$150 for a case. Philanthropic and public health funds will be required to aid their distribution, make them readily available to all as they were in the case of Patient Nugent at Torrance Memorial hospital.

Mrs. Carrie Parks of 1003 Portola, who entered the local hospital Jan. 2, was found to be suffering from Type 30 pneumonia. No serum of this type is now available but by other medical means she was given relief and is now recovering.

"Unemployment compensation pays half the weekly wage earned by the insured worker, but not less than \$7 week nor more than \$15 a week. The limit for benefits is 26 weeks of \$300. Only those who earned \$156 in at least two calendar quarters are eligible for compensation, and of course they must be unemployed. There is a waiting period during which the employment service attempts to place the applicant in suitable employment. This waiting period is four weeks, and if the applicant is still unemployed at the end of that time compensation is payable beginning the fifth week, although not until the seventh week is the check actually delivered to applicant by the Unemployment Resources Commission."

The California State Employment Service is one of the divisions of the State Department of Employment. The Employment Service is not new—it dates back to 1916. Now it is enlarged and amplified and is an up-to-date, state-wide chain of no-charge employment agencies, staffed with trained, experienced personnel experts, Manager Ellis said.

"The motto of the California State Employment Service is 'Match the Man and the Job.' It is affiliated with the United States Employment Service of Washington, D. C. Under the Social Security Act, the Employment Service acts to disburse unemployment compensation benefits as a sideline to its main job of getting orders or workers from private industry, business and commerce and then selecting the most capable applicants for each job."

Employers are asked to remember that jobs, not benefits, offer the only real "social security." "We are going to be pretty busy taking claims for benefits for a few weeks, but we don't want to forget that our real business is promoting employment. We want employers of all kinds—business men, factory superintendents, householders, agriculturists, stores, offices, everyone—to use the California State Employment Service. It can save the employer time, trouble and money in the long run, because it can select the one best applicant for any specific job. The C.S.E.S. has everyone registered or at least will have in the near future."
