Vocational Guide Work in H. S. Gets Notice

The largest gathering of Torrance high school students yet to attend one of the vocational guidance conferences being held fortnightly with the cooperation of the Torrance Rotary club, which instituted the idea, assembled Monday morning to hear details of the construction part of the American airplane industry.

Ed Stanbury, personnel manager for the North American Aviation company at Inglewood, was the conference leader and he gave the students who appeared keenly interested, some informative data about the jobs and positions which airplane construction offer young men and women.

Here to observe the operation of vocational guidance conferences was Marvin Park of Beverly Hills, governor of this Rotary district. He also addressed the students briefly on the opportunities such meetings give in preparation for adult life. Afterward Park visited the school library to see the volumes on vocational subjects which the local Rotary club has made available to Torrance students.

Meets With Editors
He said that Rotary International was very much interested in the work the local club was doing toward helping students obtain information in their last year of high school that will enable them to go into business or industry better equipped.

Principal Thomas H. Elson gave further details of the "Torrance plan" as the vocational work has become known in both school and Rotary circles, to editors of the Los Angeles School Journal Monday night at a dinner-meeting.

The Journal intends to publish a series devoted toward vocational instruction, and Elson was invited to give the editors first-hand information on how the vocational conferences are arranged and conducted here.

Perfume Project For Alondra Park Believed Killed

Despite a strong endorsement by Joseph Mesmer's investigating committee in a report to the board of supervisors, the proposed allocation of \$25,000 in county funds to finance a perfume flower experimental project at Alondra Park near here was believed definitely killed yesterday.

The supervisors referred the proposal to the experimental division of the University of California after representatives of the Property Owners' association appeared to express vigorous protest against spending tax funds for such a purpose.

Valley-to-Sea Route Needs Cities' Okay

Agitation has been started for another direct highway between San Fernando and Palos Verdes Hills, Los Angeles county officials were informed in a resolution from the Hawthorne city council. The proposal, endorsed by the Hawthorne council, is for a route via Laurel Canyon boulevard, Hawthorne boulevard, Lankershim boulevard, Highland avenue, La Brea boulevard, Hawthorne boulevard and Pasa Agua Negra drive through the Palos Verdes hills.

George Jones, county road commissioner, said the county would await further endorsement by cities and communities along the route before any recommendation was made to the county supervisors.

The state is constructing its Sepulveda boulevard project as a secondary state artery to carry through traffic around the congested area, and only a half-mile section remains to be constructed, near Jefferson boulevard. Solution of a serious drainage problem is what is holding up this final link.
