"Spirit" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday in all Christian Science Churches, branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts. The Golden Text is from Paul's epistle to the Ephesians: "Grieve not the holy Spirit of God, whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption." The Lesson-Sermon includes also these words of Paul to the Galatians: "For, brethren, ye have been called unto liberty; only use not liberty for an occasion to the flesh, but by love serve one another. . . . This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would. . . . If we live in the Spirit, let us also walk in the Spirit." Among the correlative passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, is the statement: "Mistaking his origin and nature, man believes himself to be combined matter and Spirit. . . . No more sympathy exists between the flesh and Spirit than between Belial and Christ."

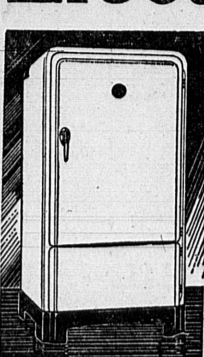
