Steel Expansion Tapering Off

The steel companies of the United States will spend but half as much in 1938 for new equipment as they did in 1937, the American Iron & Steel Institute estimated in a statement released today. Approximately \$105,000,000 has been allocated for new equipment this year, while last year the steel companies expended \$320,000,000 for this same purpose.

The prospective decline from the 1937 total reflects not only the current low level of operations, but also the fact that many companies completed large

HOW CITY POSTS WERE FILLED HERE

Because Torrance is on the eve of another municipal election, The Herald presents the following concise history of past balloting on city offices with two purposes in mind: To inform newcomers of former civic servants and to provide a reference source for the settlement of any election wagers on "who ran and how the election went" in past years.

May 15, 1921—A few days after Torrance was incorporated, the first city council assembled, chose the late George A. Proctor president. Members were R. R. Smith, Wallace H. Gilbert, Joseph Stone and J. M. Fitzhugh.

April 10, 1922—Fitzhugh elected president by Councilmen Edwin H. Nash, Proctor, Gilbert and Stone. Votes cast: 592. A. H. Bartlett elected city clerk succeeding Robert J. Deiningner who had served as appointed clerk since incorporation. Fitzhugh succeeded by Gilbert as president, April 17, 1923. Nash resigned, succeeded by F. A. Zeller, Dec. 11, 1923.

Drop 'President' Title
April 14, 1924—Willis M. Brecks, J. S. Torrance and Deiningner elected. Votes cast: 850. Smith named president a week later.

April 12, 1926—John Dennis, Charles Inman and Brady Wolfe elected. Votes cast 1,151. Dennis chosen president, April 19, 1926, and Smith resigns, being succeeded by T. F. Foley. Foley resigned May 16, 1927, succeeded by Earl Conner. In August, 1927, the title "president" was dropped for the present "mayor."

April 9, 1928—G. A. Maxwell elected. Dennis and Raymond re-elected. Votes cast: 2,225. Dennis re-elected mayor. Inman resigns April 15, 1929, G. A. R. Steiner appointed. Steiner resigns May 6, 1929, succeeded by Ed C. Nelson. Steiner re-appointed May 28, 1929, to succeed Raymond who died.

April 15, 1930—Carleton Bell elected. Steiner. Votes cast: 1,077. Dennis re-elected mayor.

Up to Date
April 11, 1932—Scott Ludlow, William Klusman, J. M. Wright, and Conner elected. Votes cast: 2,300. Klusman elected mayor. On Steiner's death in July, 1932 James Hitechock appointed. Klusman ousted as mayor, Sept.

The present incumbents—Councilmen Hitechock and Deiningner, Clerk Bartlett and Treasurer Ludlow—have not made any public declaration of their intentions to seek re-election. Of the quartet, Bartlett is seen as a certain entrant in the race. He was elected in April, 1922, and has been re-elected four times.

There have been 64 men entered in the race for council positions here in the past nine municipal elections. Nine have sought to wrest the clerk's office from Bartlett and Harry Dolley, the city's first treasurer, was opposed by six.

time for the commencement of a conference of the parties for the purpose of negotiating the terms and conditions of a change of the 1937 agreement, which conference shall be at the office of the Columbia Steel company in San Francisco, unless otherwise mutually agreed.

"(b) If, because of a failure to agree, the 1937 agreement is not changed by a written agreement entered into by the company and the Union within 20 days from the giving of said notice, then the 1937 agreement and all of the provisions thereof shall terminate upon the expiration of 20 days from the giving of said notice.

"Section 2. Notice hereunder shall be given by registered mail, be completed by and at the time of mailing and if by the company be addressed to the Steel Workers' Organizing Committee, Grant Building, Pittsburgh, Pa., and if by the Union be addressed to the Company, Russ Building, San Francisco. Either party may by like written notice, change the address to which registered mail notice to it shall be given.
