The Meat Cutter's Union, Local 551 of the A. F. of L. of San Pedro, has seen fit to picket my establishment with San Pedro pickets because I will not accede to their demands... demands which would be ruinous to my business.

First of all, there is no dissatisfaction over wages or hours in this market. My only employee, an apprentice, and a young Torrance boy, is required to pay \$100 initiation fee if he joins the A. F. of L. and then is not sure of his job. He will only work if and when the Union says so. If I were to discharge this apprentice I would have to hire a journeyman meat cutter sent to me from San Pedro, at a salary I cannot afford to pay. Business conditions make it impossible to operate the market by myself.

These are the facts. In the face of them I cannot feel justified in signing. However, I would appreciate an opinion from my friends and customers; certainly I would like to rely on their support and loyalty in this crisis.
