JOY CLINIC HELD HERE

We have health clinics, child clinics, and household clinics, but the latest is a joy clinic. Dr. and Mrs. A. E. Bartlett conducted Torrance's first joy clinic last Tuesday afternoon and evening, under the combined auspices of four Torrance churches.

Dr. Bartlett, a former minister of New York City, conceived the idea of such a clinic 10 years ago, when he became convinced that churches needed to emphasize the joy found in the Christian religion.

Especially for women was the address "Spiritual Housekeeping," by Mrs. Bartlett. She suggested ways of bringing the spirit of joy and calmness into the housewife's daily task. She compared ironing to smoothing out the wrinkles of life, and suggested other thoughts for various household duties.

The day was concluded by an address by Dr. Bartlett on "The Religion of Joy."

HOMEMAKERS FRESH FOODS MARKET REVIEW

NOW IN SEASON AND PLENTIFUL
Cabbage—Quality of cabbage has greatly improved from last week. The heads are much more solid. Prices are low.

Potatoes—U. S. number one Russet potatoes from Idaho are excellent values at the low prices quoted. They are packed in fifteen pound mesh bags. British Queen new potatoes from San Diego County are very nice, and low in price.

Yams—Nancy Hall yams from New Mexico and local red yams are in generous supply, although the season is nearing its end. Prices are low on smooth, uniform sized yams.

Avocados—Large size avocados are the best buys this week. Thin-skinned, Fuerte is the variety that is most plentiful.

Grapefruit—Some grapefruit is coming from Coachella and some from Imperial, at the present time. Largest sizes are in heaviest supplies and most reasonable.

Oranges—Fine foothill navel oranges are featured this week. Prices are low on all sizes; quality is "top."

ON THE MARKET BUT HIGH IN PRICE
Asparagus—We are still promised low prices on asparagus, probably within three or four days . . . depending on the weather. Local and Northern asparagus are expected to reach the market in huge supply at about the same time.

Squash—Italian squash of good quality is coming in light shipments from Imperial Valley. Prices are rather high. The first picking of summer squash was very poor, but the second picking, due in about a week, should be of much improved quality.

VARYING IN SUPPLY
Lettuce—There's a poor outlook for good lettuce during the next few weeks. The Arizona crop is about exhausted. Several sections of Northern California are starting to send in small quantities. Indications point to higher prices and smaller heads of lettuce until about April 15.

Peas—Most of the peas now coming in are from San Diego County. The quality is good, but prices are due to advance because of limited supplies.

caption: "Where to Now?" and "National Restoration Week, March 20-26."

"The Federal government has mapped out a splendid program of conserving the natural refuges of small and large game," Scott declared. "It is up to those of us who want to continue lawful hunting to cooperate. The best way to describe what the government, sportsmen and land owners want to accomplish is to quote from the article 'Fuss and Feathers' which appeared in last week's Collier's. This article said: 'Game management is nothing more or less than a three-way agreement among the state, the sportsman and the farmer. The state supplies game and stocks it, posts the land as a controlled shooting

area, assigns wardens to guard against trespass . . . The sportsman respects the trespass rights of the landowner, obeys any emergency restrictions authorized by the state, pays sufficient funds to cover the cost of replacing game that he shoots. And the landowner learns to consider the sportsman not as a trespasser or enemy, but, instead, as a valued customer who comes each year to purchase the surplus game crop that he has raised on his farm.'"
