Employers Must Register With State Job Bureau

Torrance employers were warned today by Melville Z. Ellis, manager of the Department of Employment office, 1927 Carson, to register with the Department.

"Employers who hire from four to seven persons in subject employment must pay contributions to the Unemployment Trust Fund beginning Jan. 1, 1938," said Dr. Ellis. "Contributions for the first quarter were due and payable on April 30. Consequently, the employer who is not registered faces an interest penalty if his contribution is not made by that date. Registration blanks are obtainable at the local office."

Bourbons Hold Big Voter Lead

Democratic ranks have gained approximately eight times as many new names on the poll books of Los Angeles county as have Republican forces since the first year, it was reported this week by County Registrar of Voters W. M. Kerr.

Democratic party strength in the county now stands at 737,174, as compared to 442,349 for the Republicans, Kerr's books show. Democrats have gained 5,580 since last January 1, as compared with 895 for the Republicans.

Registrations are being made at the rate of about 300 a day at the registrar's headquarters at Third and Broadway, Los Angeles. Most of these are transfers, however, only about one-fourth being new registrations.

5 More Deep Wells Brought In This Week

on the next location west of Kelly's, which is now standing, completed at 3,530 feet, Santa Fe's No. 24, the original well in the field, which has been perforated and looks very good, according to reports; and Neil Anderson's No. 2 on Sepulveda near Arlington which is standing cemented for a water shut-off.

Doyle's Bond lease was obtained from Al Bond, veteran barber here, while the Neil lease was signed over by a group of men headed by George W. Neill, Dr. J. S. Lancaster, Sam Levy and others.

No well in South Torrance has yet equalled the production record of Charles W. Camp's hole on the north side of 230th at Pennsylvania. This well is running between 293 and 270 barrels daily with the average about 275. It has been on production for about two weeks and is regarded by oil observers to be the best in the field, running clean, cutting less than one percent and showing 26 degree gravity.

Many are Drilling
Santa Fe's No. 31 opened the top of the producing zone and its fluid level is reported rising rapidly. The operators are shooting a few holes at a time and then waiting for results and further tests. Perforating should be finished sometime today, it is understood.
Other South Torrance activity includes another deepener by McCaslin Oil and Woolner Oil. Four-Way Oil is starting another rig on 227th and Pennsylvania and Lakeside Oil is drilling on Sepulveda and has staked a location at 227th and Pennsylvania for its No. 2. Most of the drilling activity is located between Sepulveda and 231st street at the present time.
