## ROAD GROUP MAPS WORK

Immediate improvement and widening of Hawthorne avenue and La Brea boulevard is the first objective of the Southwest District Highways association, it was decided last Thursday night at a meeting of city and civic leaders from Torrance and eight surrounding communities at the Palos Verdes Country club.

Opening of the Hollywood Turf club southeast of Inglewood June 10 will seriously complicate traffic problems in adjoining communities, members of the association were told, according to Leonard Young, assistant city engineer here who is secretary of the group. Representatives of the County Regional Planning commission spoke on the problems arising out of the Santa Anita race track opening and its effect on adjacent cities.

Fear of "bottle-necking" traffic at various points toward the Inglewood track was expressed and current work to avoid that danger, such as sign posting and traffic routing, was discussed. The next meeting of the highways group will be held in May at the Palos Verdes Country club.
