

# Council Meets April 13 to Canvass Vote and Install Winners

## Local Industries' Products Used In Drilling World's Deepest Oil Well

Hope of discovering oil at the Continental Oil's KCL A-2 well near Wasco, California are fading but the operators are said to be satisfied. They have set a world's record for the deepest well in the world by more than 1,200 feet. The KCL is down to 14,200 at last report and still the rig is turning. Continental Oil may stop the work soon but the project will be the source of conjecture and study for many years to come.

Contributing to the amazing drill record are three Torrance industrial firms and two subsidiaries of the U. S. Steel corporation, Columbia Steel and the American Steel and Wire company. National Supply's "Ideal" equipment was used to equip the KCL. International Derrick and Equipment company supplied the derrick and Hydril company furnished the internal flush-drill pipe joints from top to bottom on the longest string of drill pipe ever used.

National Supply's "Ideal" "BK" slips were selected for the well because of their reliability. Other National equipment such as draw-works, slush pump, Ideal-Ajax twin engine, automatic grip elevator and spider and spang "extreme line" casing were also employed on the record-breaking well. Hydril

## Six-Week Old Robbery Just Reported

"Better late than never" evidently was the motto adopted by the owner of a service station east of Hawthorne on Highway 101 Monday. He reported to police the theft—some six weeks ago—of a slot machine vending peanuts, gum and candy.

Equipment on the KCL job consisted of drill pipe joints and drilling and fishing safety joints. Continental may not take its well much deeper, but an official of the company determined that the well, if drilled through the earth, would come out on the other side about 600 miles from Madagascar.

While the seven-inch casing was standing cemented at 11,573 feet the well was surveyed and found to have its maximum drift at bottom and this was only 21 feet off from the vertical projection of the surface location. This proved that the well is extremely straight for one of its depth. The temperature reported at bottom was 255 degrees F.

## Session Tuesday Night Devoted to Routine Business

City councilmen in session Tuesday night were informed by City Clerk A. H. Bartlett that the next meeting will be held not on Tuesday night, April 12, but because that is election day, the session will be convened Wednesday night, April 13, at 7:45 o'clock. At that time the council will canvass the vote of the preceding day and the elected two members will be installed. This week the council transacted the following business:

**FOX EARM**—D. H. Ross of Redondo Beach wrote asking if there would be any objection to his installing a silver fox farm on some property he was planning to buy east of Hawthorne avenue and north of Torrance's boulevard. His inquiry was held over for investigation.

**FRANCHISE**—The Shell Oil company reported its franchise earnings were \$180.74 for the past year.

**CHAMBER REPORT**—Three reports and a request for allocation of \$1,800 to meet expenses for the current quarter were received from the Torrance Chamber of Commerce. The allocation from the promotion fund was allowed. The reports detailed: (1) financial business for the preceding quarter ending March 31; (2) an outline of activities for the current three-month period; and (3) planned expenditures for this quarter.

**NEW EQUIPMENT**—On motion by Councilman James Hitchcock, an expenditure of \$254.74 for the municipal water department was approved. One hundred cement meter boxes and repair parts for 600 meters are to be purchased from this appropriation.

**FREE RENT**—A request from the Fern Avenue P.T.A. for the free use of the Civic Auditorium Saturday night when a bazaar will be held to raise funds for child welfare work was allowed.

**MUSIC REPORT**—George Mershon of the Torrance Musicians' Society asked for a report on the progress of the council's investigation of a proposition presented at the last meeting by his society. The proposition, "That the council grant \$500 for presentation of one symphony concert and one opera performance this season; undertake a study to 'further the Torrance Symphony in 1938-39.' Councilman Tom McGuire replied that the council committee charged with this study was not ready to report yet, would make its findings known at the next council meeting.

**MAKES DEBUT**—In his first public appearance since he became a candidate, Joel Hargberg, Walteria longshoreman, used the council session for a sounding board while he harangued the councilmen about his opinion regarding "improvements" for his district.
