Sandwich Combinations

When in search of an unusual filling for the lunch-box sandwich, try combining one part orange juice with two parts cream cheese. Beat to consistency of thick cream.

Orange juice, by the way, combines especially well with dried fruits, such as chopped raisins, figs, dates and with chopped nuts to make flavorful fillings.

Try spreading one slice of sandwich with orange marmalade and the other slice with cream cheese, cottage cheese or peanut butter. Toast sandwich if desired.

Pinwheel Biscuits

2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
4 tablespoons shortening
¾ cup milk
¼ cup raisins, chopped
½ teaspoon cinnamon
2 tablespoons sugar
Mix and sift flour, baking powder, salt and two teaspoons sugar. Cut in the shortening. Add the milk. Toss on a floured board. Roll to one-quarter inch thickness. Mix the raisins, cinnamon and two tablespoons sugar. Sprinkle over the dough. Roll like a jelly roll. Slice off pieces about three-quarters of an inch thick. Place on a buttered pan. Bake in a quick oven, about ten or fifteen minutes.

People Urged To Forget All About Dieting

ST. LOUIS (U.P.)—If Americans would forget about dieting for the next 10 years, they would be better off.

Likewise if they would discard such fallacious superstitions that too much salt hardens the arteries, that fish is good brain food, that a clean tooth never decays, and that sugar burns up fat in the body, they would be a lot healthier.

So argues Dr. Howard W. Haggard, author of "Devils, Drugs and Doctors." In a speech here he scoffed at current fads, ridiculed foods and cosmetics which have "health appeal," and called modern pseudo-scientific dieting foibles as comical as the Victorian ladies who deliberately simulated a tuberculosis condition for the sake of fashion.

"We used to eat because we liked food," he declared. "But we don't any more. The country has been made diet-conscious. Because a young advertiser discovered something in an encyclopedia about sugar burning away fat in the human body and without investigating the subject any further he framed a slogan to give his product health appeal. And so millions of women drink sugar-water. I believe the American public would benefit if they stopped thinking about diet for 10 years."


