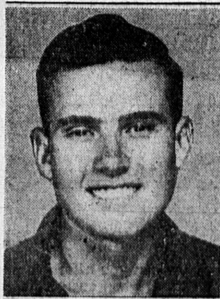
OPEN HOUSE . . . was held last night. Many students and their parents visited the various night school activities and then attended the Spring fashion show.

The Golden Text is from Ezekiel: "Have I any pleasure at all that the wicked should die? saith the Lord God: and not that he should return from his ways, and live?"

One of the Bible selections in the Lesson-Sermon includes the verses from Job: "I would seek unto God, and unto God would I commit my cause; . . . He disappointeth the devices of the crafty, so that their hands cannot perform their enterprise. He taketh the wise in their own craftiness: and the counsel of the froward is carried headlong." The Lesson-Sermon presents also this passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Mere legal pardon and there is no other, for divine Principle never pardons our sins or mistakes till they are corrected) leaves the offender free to repeat the offense, if indeed, he has not already suffered sufficiently from vice to make him turn from it with loathing. Truth bestows no pardon upon error, but wipes it out in the most effectual manner."
