"Why art thou cast down, O my soul? and why art thou disquieted within me? hope thou in God: for I shall yet praise him, who is the health of my countenance, and my God." Among the passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, are the words: "Christian Science raises the standard of liberty and crime: 'Follow me! Escape from the bondage of sickness, sin, and death!' Jesus marked out the way."
