Group Hospital Plan Offered Here.

or more employees 40 to 60 percent must enroll, depending upon the total number of workers and the percentage of women in the group.

Subscribers to the group hospitalization plan as offered by the Torrance Memorial hospital receive service in case of accident, emergency illness or injury immediately after their application has been accepted. Hospital maternity care is included any time after husband and wife have been members for one year.

Rates have been so established that the plan is designed to operate on a self-sustaining basis. Subscription charges are: For employed groups where 50 percent of employees are men, 75 cents per month, \$2.60 quarterly, \$5 semi-annually or \$9 annually; for groups less than 60 percent men, 85 cents monthly, \$10 annually; an employed man and wife, \$1.50 monthly, \$18 annually; man, wife and all un-married children under 10 years of age, \$2 monthly, \$24 annually. This latter seven-cents-a-day service for whole families is available only to groups and is limited to husband and wife, one of whom must be employed by the organization.

Additional details regarding the group hospitalization plan as offered by Torrance Memorial hospital may be obtained at the institution's office and from any local physician.
