Group Hospital Plan Offered Here-

(Continued from Page 1-B) or more employes 40 to 60 per cent must enroll, dependin upon the total number of work ers and the percentage of wome in the group.

cent must enton, upon the total number of workers and the percentage of women in the group.

Subseribers to the group hospitalization plan as offered by the Torrance Memorial-hospital-receive-service in case of accident, emergency illness or indury immediately after their application has been accepted. Hospital maternity care is included any time after husband and wife have been members for one year.

Rates have been so established that the plan is designed to operate on a self-sustaining basis. Subscription charges are: For employed groups where 60 percent of employes are men, 75 cents per month, \$2.60 quarterly, \$5 semi-annually or \$9 annually; for groups less than 60 percent men, \$5 cents monthly, \$10 annually; an employed and wife, \$15 monthly, \$14 annually; and minder 19 years of age, \$2 monthly, \$24 annually; this latter sevencents-aday service for whole families is available only to groups and is limited to luss band and wife, one of whom must be employed by the organization.
