Friends Here Mourn Death Of Dry Leader

The death of Col. Frank B. Ebbert, 58, noted prohibition worker and former Los Angeles attorney in Washington Sunday of a heart ailment brought grief to the J. W. McMillan home here and scores of local people who knew him mourned his passing. His widow, Mrs. Mayne Ebbert, is a sister of McMillan and Ebbert was well known here because of his frequent visits. He had been ill for about eight months.

For the last five years Col. Ebbert had been employed as national counselor for the Methodist Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals. He was formerly general counsel and legislative superintendent for the Anti-Saloon League of America on the Pacific Coast. A veteran of the Spanish-American and World Wars, he is survived by two daughters in addition to his devoted wife.

The funeral ceremonies were scheduled for this morning at Fort Meyer chapel in the nation's capital. Burial will be in Arlington National cemetery.

Slough Drainage Project Is Held "Undersized"

The county flood control district cannot recommend an application for a \$205,000 Laguna Dominguez (formerly Nigger Slough) WPA project, because "such an undersized project would not be sound," Chief Engineer C. H. Howell reported to the board of supervisors this week.

The report was made in reply to a recent request as to whether or not Howell had sufficient data to substantiate such an application. He replied that he had the data, but was unable to recommend construction. He will continue to study the project.

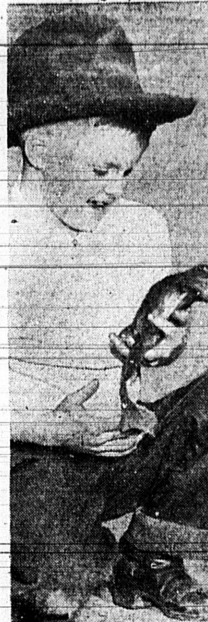
White Road Line To Be Re-Painted

This will not be a disappointment to the school group because the P.T.A. is reported to have changed its opinion of the different location for the pedestrian lane and now desires that it remain where it is.

These are sad days for some of the youngsters attending Torrance Elementary school. The livestock of the school "farm" is being sold.

Boys and girls who have become attached to the inhabitants of pens and buildings are somberly bidding goodbye to chickens, rabbits, ducks and guinea pigs who have been objects of much affection during the past months.

The "farm" stock is being disposed of in order that the pens and buildings may be re-painted and repaired during the remainder of the present term. It is hoped Principal Marie E. Holbach said this week, that the "farm" will be enlarged next term to house a goat and perhaps a pig.

The candidates were selected by the nominating committee composed of President E. M. Barber, J. O. Bishop, J. O. Boyd, Dr. J. S. Lancaster and Dean Sears.

Freak Accident Claims Man's Life on Road

An inquest was held this morning at Stone and Myers' chapel into the cause of the accident which caused the sudden death of Lee Horning, 43, Los Angeles milkman, last Monday afternoon on Normandie avenue about three-quarters of a mile north of Lomita boulevard. The coroner's jury decided that the fatality was due to an unavoidable accident.

Horning was found in a dying condition beside his wrecked Ford delivery truck, which had, in some strange manner, turned turtle without striking any other car or obstruction in the road. Deputy sheriffs investigating the fatality expressed the opinion that a spring shackle broke and locked the wheels of the car while Horning was traveling at high speed north on Normandie. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Horning, owners of an independent milk business, serving the area around Lomita boulevard.
